CONGRESSMAN HAWLEY HAS CATECHISM

be in the market for logs from these rivers.

Ans. W. S. Lamm—There are two logging contracts now being held up on account of rivers being closed.

We find that a number of subcontracts are also being held up.

Question 2.—What mills get their log supplies and the amount thereof on each river?

Ans. Graves—The Mutual Milling company, daily capacity 50,000 feet; the Pine Tree Lumber company, under construction, daily capacity 150,000 feet.

Ans. Watson—But one mill is located on Williamson River.

The Long Lake Lumber company also uses logs from this river, and has a capacity of 40,000 feet.

Algonia will be in the market for logs from these rivers.

Question 3.—Advise me whether all the timber is owned by Indians, or whether other owners have timber that it is desired to log, and if so in what quantities.

Ans. Graves—The timber is all owned by Indians.

Ans. Watson—All the timber on this river is owned by Indians except 320 acres.

Ans. Lamm—There is considerable timber scattered through the reservation that is owned by outsiders that would naturally come down these rivers.

Question 6.—Can any portion of the logs be shipped on the railroad without first being run in the river?

Ans. Watson—It is possible, but not practicable. Too much difference in cost of transportation.

Ans. Lamm—About 15 per cent can be shipped on railroad. Cost is prohibitive.

Question 7.—If any logs can be loaded directly on the railroad, what would the total of such logs probably amount to?

Ans. Graves—Approximately 1 per cent.

Ans. Watson—About 2,000,000,000 feet.

Ans. Lamm—One per cent.

Question 8.—Is there logging service on the railroad now?

Ans. Graves—Yes, but service not satisfactory. Costs more to ship logs than lumber.

Ans. Watson—Yes; Southern Pacific company has rate of \$1.50 per 1,000 against 25 cents by water. It seems that the difference of rates between logging by rail and water are so great that the former cannot be considered.

The people in a new country face difficulties peculiar to these conditions. They must engage in which occupations they can, and sawmilling has always been one of the most available in new and forested localities. The rivers furnish a way to get the logs cheaply to the mills, as compared with the railroad charges—as shown above—where the railroad service can be used at all.
