Scalloped ruffles set about the hips in tulle fashion is another popular manner of trimming the frock. Quaint little taffeta turbans and polk bonnets wired high with towering bows and loops are profuse among the new spring hats, and the same shapes, developed in

wired black and white shades of tulle are also noticeable.

Straw hats veiled in tulle promise to be favorite head coverings and the flowers that bloom in the spring, tulle, are also already casting their shadows before in the guise of vivid hued wreaths on the between-season hats.
