Madero Sr. in Ignorance That Son Was Fighting

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Francisco Madero, father of the murdered president of Mexico, learned through the moving pictures today that his son, Raoul Madero, is fighting in General Pancho Villa's rebel army in Northern Mexico.

The father had been kept in ignorance of this fact by the other members of the family.

This afternoon a film company held a private exhibition, at which motion pictures taken on the firing line at the battle of Ojinaga were shown. Madero was one of the invited guests. In one place, where General Villa, was shown prominently in directing his troops, his aide-de-camp galloped up on horseback. It was Madero's youngest son.

"Raoul, Raoul!" he cried, "I did not know you were fighting the dictator."

Says Oregon Gets Good Share

Reclamation Service Will Ask for Hundred Million, and Will Irrigate Wherever Possible

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—Eighty millions of dollars have been invested by the government in reclamation projects within fifteen states, according to Will H. King, chief counsel of the reclamation service, who told the purposes and accomplishments of that department in an address before the members of the Progressive Business Men's Club recently.

That amount, he said, had been loaned to the people, to be repaid in ten equal installments after the projects are completed.

King explained that the reclamation service is operated under a sort of commission form of government, in that it is under the direction of five commissioners.

Among these, he said, is a supervisor of irrigation, who instructs the farmers and makes extensive investigations; a comptroller, who looks after the fiscal end of the work.

"Oregon has as favorable an outlook in the way of irrigation projects as any state in the West," said King. "The western and eastern parts of this state are different in that the eastern part is arid, while the western part is non-arid—even in the counties where it is dry."

There are in Baker county alone 10,000 acres that could be reclaimed by the government. Eight hundred thousand dollars have been appropriated for the development of the West 1 matilla project, and over half a million for work on the Horniston and Klamath projects.

King said that Oregon had contributed more to the reclamation service

than any other state with the exception of Oklahoma. He said, however, that at present there are no available funds to carry on the work, and that the department is awaiting further appropriations.

He said that the department was planning to ask a loan of \$100,000,000 of congress.

King said he expected to see \$200,000,000 invested in the various projects within the next ten years.

The government would place homes where they were never dreamed of before. It is the plan, he said, to irrigate every available foot of land that

could be utilized.

Such a step, he explained, would double the population.

In this connection he said that the government is willing at all times to co-operate with the state officials, and added that Oregon had set the example in that direction. One of the greatest needs, he pointed out, is more state commissioners to adjudicate water rights on the various projects.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Law of Reward and Punishment"

"If thou doest well, shalt thou not be accepted? And if thou doest not well, sin lieth at the door."—Genesis, 4:7.

In our text God calls Cain's attention to the law of reward and punishment. This is evidently a law that Cain is familiar with. When God said, "If thou doest well, shalt thou not be accepted?" He simply asked a question for the purpose of reminding Cain of something that he knew very well, but had failed to take into consideration.



After God had called Cain's attention to this law of reward and punishment, He then left the man to work out his own destiny. That is the way God does now. He is constantly calling our attention to some law that we are violating or are about to violate. During the past week Dr. Hodge has told us of many laws of health. We violate some law of health and get sick; in the sickness God is trying to remind us of the law we have violated. When a man gets drunk and gets into trouble, God speaks to him through his trouble just as plainly as can be, and says: "Don't you know that you cannot get drunk without getting into trouble?" When a city or a nation violates God's law of Sabbath ob-

servance and loses its power, like Spain did, then God speaks through the loss of power, and says: "Don't you know that you cannot violate the law of Sabbath observance without having to pay the penalty?"

There is a lot of difference between knowing and doing. Cain knew that there was profit in doing well, and danger in doing evil, and yet he did that which was evil. Almost every young man who uses alcohol knows of the danger, and yet hundreds of thousands of them use it. One reason for this discrepancy between knowledge and conduct is that we think there is a chance for us to escape the consequences of evil doing, and a chance that we may not get the reward for well doing. There is nothing either in Nature or in God's word to warrant us in thinking that there is any chance about it. Every one who heard Dr. Hodge's lecture on alcoholism last week must know that there is no possibility of using alcohol and escaping the evil effects, even though it be used ever so moderately. For the law is just as inflexible as the law of gravitation. When we learn this thoroughly and eradicate the thought that there is a chance to escape the consequences, then there will be less discrepancy between knowledge and conduct. But the law of reward for well doing and punishment for evil doing is just as inflexible from top to bottom as the law of alcoholism. Jesus taught that a man could not so much as think evil and escape the consequence of that evil thought.
