TO INCORPORATE BASEBALL CLUB

NEW PLAN OUTLINED AT SUNDAY'S MEETING, WHICH WOULD TEND TO INCREASE THE PATRONAGE

About thirty ball players and fans gathered in the old band rooms in the rear of the Palm Clear Store Sunday afternoon, and started a movement that will certainly result in Klamath Falls having a baseball team backed by the entire business interests of the city.

The proposition, which received the unanimous approval of every one present, is to have a committee of business men organize a company to issue stock in a Klamath Falls baseball organization. This stock will be sold to the merchants, professional men, real estate men, fans, in fact, to all the people of the city, in amounts very small, so that everyone would have an opportunity to get a share of two.

This would insure the necessary bonding on the part of the people to make baseball pay. Every stockholder would naturally like to see the game patronized, and would boost for attendance at games, instead of some knocking, as has been the experience in the past.

It is believed that such stock would actually declare dividends, and it is certain that the business men would favor this method of getting the necessary funds to start a ball team in preference to the subscription list.

The coming fight between Packie McFarland and Mike Gibbons, the cleverest boxers in the world in any division, will be one of the most interesting contests seen in the ring for many years—if it is not a fake. McFarland is undoubtedly the cleverest boxer in the ring. Few men of the past have equaled him. Jim Driscoll, the wonderful little featherweight of England, who spent several months in the United States knocking out the lightweights, and Young Griffo, the Australian, now a ruler of the barrooms, were his superiors. But it is doubtful if other clever men of the past, men like Jim Corbett, Jack McAuliffe or Joe Gans, were as clever as mere boxers.

Gibbons has been a revelation since he has shown himself out of his St. Paul home. No middleweight in the ring now, and perhaps none since Tommy Ryan, has proved himself as good as a boxer. Men like Ketchel and Walcott, and Langford—when he was in the middleweight class—might have whipped him, but they would have had to go some to do it. McFarland has faked so much that it is quite impossible to grow very en-

thusiastic over the match. He has permitted such boxers as Owen Moran and Abe Attell—both much lighter—and Tommy Murphy, a fine second-rater, to stay ten rounds with him. In fact, he has come very near saying that he did not try to knock out his men—which is faking. He says he will make 142 pounds for Gibbons. It is very doubtful if he makes 145, despite the fact that he has been posing as a lightweight. Gibbons, in his last fight, weighed 152½. Some of his friends think he can make 145 easier than McFarland.

Ulsterite Army Now Has a Motor Corps

BELFAST, Ireland, Jan. 24.—At headquarters of the Ulster provisional government, which is fighting home rule, it was announced today that the "army of Ulster," composed of 500,000 men who have been secretly drilled, to oppose the Dublin parliament, will be supplemented with a motorcycle corps.

The members of this corps will carry dispatches, and in some instances act as scouts in the event of actual hostilities. The corps is composed of fifty men at present. This number, it was said today, will be increased to more than 300 if the threatened break occurs.
