Last Week Was Dull in the Livestock Trade

(Herald Special Service)

PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—Livestock receipts totaled considerably less last week than the week previous, and business was not so brisk. The cattle situation failed to clear, and on only one day, Monday, was there any interest aroused.

A few cars of choice steers brought \$7.60 and a load of young cows \$6.75. The bulk of the steer sales for the week averaged \$7 to \$7.25, and cows \$6 to \$6.25.

All other butcher classes were slow, and the principal cause of price weakness was inferior beef quality and too much of it.

The hog market maintained its strength easily from beginning to the end. Prices never rose above \$8.05,

but choice light stock averaged round 8 cents all week.

A lot of swine that lacked prime finish sold at lower prices, but good quality pigs and smooth heavy stuff found a quick sale at steady prices. Receipts were fairly liberal, but some 2,000 less than for the same period last week.

Sheephouse trade was brisk only in spots, as liquidation was unsteady. Total arrivals were smaller than for the previous six days.

A good supply of prime grain-fed mutton and lambs came in the first part of the week. Wethers sold at \$5.85, and ewes \$4.75 "off cars."

Lamb buyers gave \$6.50 for the fancy grades, and were not over-supplied, either. The market closed on a weaker basis, with a 10c to 15c decline in all mutton lines.

Colonel Gorgas of Panama Is Nominated for Surgeon in Chief



President Wilson has nominated Colonel Wm. C. Gorgas, chief sanitary officer of the Panama canal, to be surgeon in chief of the army, and thus reward has come to the man who did as much as Colonel Goethals to make the canal possible.

His nomination is now before the senate, and there is little doubt that it will be confirmed after it has gone through the regular course in that body. The colonel is now in South Africa for the British government. He was sent there to improve sanitary conditions in the diamond district, and was given leave of absence by the war department for that purpose.

Without the work of Colonel Gorgas on the canal unsanitary conditions would have killed their thousands long before the work had been

brought to its present state. But he used radical measures, and now the canal zone, though in the tropics, is one of the healthiest spots on the face of the earth.

One of the largest inheritance taxes collected in Oregon will be that from the heirs of the late Ashael Bush, pioneer banker and journalist of Salem. The estate has been valued at \$2,000,000, and the inheritance tax will be about \$29,000.

Farm prospects in the vicinity of Stanfield are exceedingly bright for 1914. Many of the farmers secured their first good crop last year, and as the land is in fine condition, and many orchards are just coming into bearing, a bumper crop is expected this season.
