Colony Near Weed

A Swiss colony of large proportions composed of dairymen from the region around Newman and Los Banos in the San Joaquin Valley is assured for Shasta county, according to A. L. Harlow, realty dealer of the latter region, who was in Sacramento arranging for the purchase of another tract of land in addition to 100,000 acres owned by himself and his associates near Montague—Wood Look-out.

Some Come Out

The political field in Douglas county is not in better or worse shape than other counties of the state at this time. Every office has its talked-of candidate or candidates, as the case may be, and no office has gone begging. The primary does not promise to be filled with a long list of names for county offices. Both republicans and democrats at this time seem to feel that the fewer contests there are in the primary the better chance the successful primary candidate will have in the general election in the fall. Ordinarily Douglas county is strongly republican. It is the break in the republican primary that has caused democrats to get into office—Rueberg News.

Put It Up to Council

A new section giving to the council complete control of all public utilities owned by the city was adopted by the charter commission last night, and

will be submitted to a vote of the people when the complete new charter is submitted. The section was proposed to the committee on powers of the council, and reads: "The common council shall have full power and control of all public utilities belonging to the city." It will have the effect, if it is adopted, of abolishing the water board and returning the control of the water and light plants to the council, as before the creation of the water board—Eugene Register.

Good Storage Price

The Rogue River Fruit Association recently sold two carloads of Red Cheek Pippins which were put on the San Francisco market. The price received was \$1.10 per box, the same price that was asked the fore part of the season, but was then refused. This not only shows the advantage of the storage plant, but puts in evidence the fact that making the price and sticking to it is profitable—Medford Sun.

The Hugh Dixon is the official Medford rose selected last fall by popular vote. The school prizes will aggregate \$10—Medford Sun.

Lady Decies, once Vivian Gould, a granddaughter of Jay Gould, the first of the great American speculators, has proved to New York now that she and her family are firmly established in American society. Jay Gould himself, though one of the very richest men of his time, never got closer than the front doorstep of the "400" of his day. His granddaughter was the chief attraction in a society tableau held at the home of Mrs. Reginald de Koven, who has long been in society. The Gould family has struggled ever since the death of the founder of the house to get a place in society. The marriage of Miss Gould, daughter of George J. Gould, eldest son of the old speculator, to Lord Decies, furthered

that ambition. The wedding of another daughter, Marjorie, to young Anthony J. Drexel of the old Philadelphia family, long known in London, New York and Philadelphia society, added to the social advantages of the family. So when Lady Decies came back the other day, bringing with her a young Lord Decies, she was received with open arms by many persons who have been in society ever since her grandfather was alive. When a benefit for children's charity was planned she was among the first asked to take part. She appeared in a gorgeous creation of gold and old rose. It was a medieval gold embroidered costume and gold headpiece, which perhaps cost as much money as the entertainment netted for the poor children.
