

Suggest Commission on Power Utilities

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 27.—To prevent the "riding of a free horse to death," Illinois' new public utilities commission has found it necessary to limit the number of complaints that may be made to it.

It was announced today that a ruling which will define the nature of the complaints it will receive will be issued in the near future. Whether it will take refuge behind some system similar to that by which the high courts escape endless inquiries and pleas, by establishing a subordinate commission or tribunal which will decide the worthiness of a petition to be received, has not yet been deter-

mined, but this is thought by some to be the only solution for the problem.

There is scarcely a city in the state, it has been discovered, that has not on file a score or more of standing squabbles with utilities companies, and some which offer quarrels between competing concerns.

All have availed themselves of the opportunity offered by the new utilities law, and the commission today is literally deluged. Under the law creating the commission there is no limitation on the number of kind of petition that may be filed, and some of the commissioners are not yet sure how far they may go in their restrictive rulings.
