INDOOR GOLF IS THE LATEST GAME

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—All ya golfers who pine away and wither up during the winter because the elements are so inconsiderate as to freeze up things and generally make play out of the question, may take hope. The

problem is being solved in New York with an indoor golf links. Jerry Travers is keeping in shape for his matches next summer on one of these "courses," and professionals are doing a hand office business breaking in "duffers."

The indoor courses are so arranged here that a man can swing the ball just as hard as he would out in the open. The same sort of clubs are used, regulation balls and all that sort of thing. The only difference is that nets are put in place to catch and stop the balls, so that the building and general neighborhood may be saved from being badly punctured.

There are four driving tees on one indoor course. A big canvas shield well reinforced, hangs suspended from the ceiling about thirty feet from the tee. The shield is divided into squares, with a bullseye in the middle. A bullseye shot represents a drive of 200 yards outdoors.

Bob Fitzsimmons, perhaps the greatest fighter known to Queensberry rules, has taken the "come-back" question into the courts. When it was announced by the Atlantic Garden Athletic Club of New York city that Bob, now 52 years of age, had been matched to box Soldier Kearns for ten rounds, the boxing commission of the state issued an order that the match should not take place. The basis of the order was that Fitzsimmons was too old to fight; that a contest with such a rugged individual as the soldier might do him great harm.

Back of this was the fear that a hard blow by Kearns might kill him. Then the law creating the boxing commission and permitting ten-round fights in New York state would likely be repealed.

Fitz got a lawyer to go into court against the commission, and the question was before Supreme Court Justice Samuel Seabury for decision. The old fighter offered to show the court in any way he could that he was still fit. But the justice, who is a pretty large man, said he did not want a demonstration.

In the meantime Bob went on with his training at Plainfield, N. J. Yesterday's decision barred him from the New York prize rings.

"All these white hopes make me sick," said Fitzsimmons. "I can whip any of them if they will give me a chance to do so."

'Round the Lake Run Is Attracting Attention

It now seems practically certain that Klamath county will hold the much talked of endurance contest for stock cars this coming summer, thus taking advantage of an ideal course for such a contest. It is proposed to make the run around the Upper Lake, a distance of approximately 26 miles, with "checking in" stations about 29 miles apart.

In order to make the contest one of endurance instead of speed, a time schedule will be arranged requiring the contestants to be at the "check in" stations within ten minutes of the scheduled time.

That such a schedule can be arranged that will be fair to all class cars is conceded by all drivers who have been over the course several times.

Robert A. Johnson, in speaking of the course, said: "Last summer I drove my car to Pelican Bay Lodge two or three times a week, and the running time from Klamath Falls to the Lodge never varied more than

five minutes. Often Ray Court would be driving me, and we would time ourselves to reach a certain point along the drive at a certain time. Invariably these points would be passed right on the dot, or not more than two or three minutes off regular time."

The contest would attract attention to Klamath county from all over the world, and would bring many tourists to the ideal summer resorts of the county.

Declaring the Intention of the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls to Improve Eighth Street from Main to High Street; High Street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth Street from High to Prospect; Prospect Street from Ninth to Upham; Upham Street from Prospect to White; White Street from Upham to Delta.

The City of Klamath Falls by its Common Council resolves:

Section One—That, Whereas, a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the Common Council having for its object the improvement of Eighth street from Main to High street, High street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth street from High to Prospect; Prospect street from Ninth to Upham; Upham street from Prospect to White; White street from Upham to Delta, including all intersections of streets.

And whereas, the Common Council directed the city engineer to prepare plans and specifications and estimates of the various kinds of improvements feasible for the proposed improvement of above described streets and parts thereof, and he having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the Common Council plans and specifications and estimates of cost of the proposed improvement, and these having been duly considered by the Common Council and found satisfactory.

Be it resolved, That the said plans and specifications are approved and it is decided and determined, and the Common Council now expresses its determination to that end to improve said streets and parts thereof as described and set out herein with oil macadam pavement.

Further, that the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering such proposed work, and any contract for the construction of such improvement shall be based thereon, and the estimated cost of such work and improvement, as submitted by the city engineer at \$31,888.45, is adopted as the probable cost of said work and improvement.

Section two—The time within which remonstrances or objections may be heard against said improvement shall be on or before February 23, 1914.

Section three—The boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and is to be assessed for the cost of the said proposed improvement, is all that property lying adjacent to the said streets as far as improved and extending back from the side lines of said street to the center of the respective blocks lying

adjacent to said streets so far as improved.

Section four—The notice to property owners affected by said improvement shall be given as required by the Charter.
