BOTH WERE DECAPITATED AT THE SAME PRISON IN GERMANY—NEITHER SHOWED ANY EMOTION

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—At Ratibor prison this afternoon two women, Franziska Zimmer and Josephine Kubacka, were executed by decapitation. The Zimmer woman was convicted of murdering her step-mother, while Mrs. Kubacka was executed for the murder of her husband.

Neither woman betrayed any emotion, and faced their end without a tremor.

### Daring Aviator Dies Peaceably in Bed



Charles K. Hamilton, whose feats in the air have startled hundreds of thousands in many parts of the United States, and who had been very seriously injured several times in wrecks of his aeroplane or when he had to jump from it, was found dead in his bed at his home in New York the other day. Hamilton had experienced slight heart and lung trouble while making flights on several occasions, and once said that volplaning, or swooping down from a height, was dangerous. He often felt sorely, he said, the strain of his calling.

In Florida a year ago he leaped from his aeroplane at a height of forty feet, just as the machine turned a double somersault. He was badly hurt.

Hamilton had his first taste of flying when, attached to the tail of a kite he was drawn by a boat over the Hudson River. This was on the occasion of the visit of Prince Henry of Prussia in 1902. Four years later he made ascensions in a dirigible balloon at Coney Island, and in 1909 took his first flight in an aeroplane.

Mr. Shields was hustled out of the committee room by scared members and clerks and the door between the two offices slammed shut, barring in Johnson for perhaps a moment.

Johnson soon flung the inner door open, however, and sought to follow Shields down the corridor. He was restrained by Congressmen, Reed, Gorman and others.

Johnson upbraided his clerk, Fred Allen, for holding him when he sought to go after a pistol.

"That's all right, Ben, he's gone now," said Congressman Reed.

So angry was Johnson that it required committee members several minutes to dissuade him from an attempt to follow Shields, who vanished soon after his ejection from the committee room.

ent for one farm unit or within one year after the issue of the farm unit plan of the same issues subsequent to such proof. After such period of one year, the right of assignment shall terminate and the entry shall be conformed to one farm unit. No person shall hold by assignment more than one farm unit prior to final payment of all charges for all the land held by him, subject to the reclamation law, except operation and maintenance charges not then due.
