Notice Inviting Proposals to purchase City of Klamath Falls Registered General Municipal Coupon Bonds. Sealed proposals will be received by the police judge of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of February 9, 1914, for the purchase of \$50,000.00 City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, general municipal registered coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, authorized at an election held November 24, 1913, for the construction of a city hall. Said bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and be payable twenty years from date of issue. Interest payable semi-annually. Both principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in the city of New York. OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"God's Way Is Best"

Num. 10:29—"Come thou with us and we will do thee good."

"I sing through shade and sunshine.
And trust what e'er befall:
His way is best, it leads to rest;
My Father planned it all."

Hobab, an Arab sheik from the Gulf of Akaba, and relative by marriage of

Moses, at Mt. Sinai announces his determination to leave Israel's camp for his own home.

In our text his son-in-law tries to show the continued blessings, if he continue his journey with God's people. Macaulay

tells us that in the time of Charles I. there was one institution the people prized more highly than monarchy, and that was the church. Oh, the need of exalting the church of Christ to its rightful place! There are today so many good, moral men, believers in and staunch supporters of the Christian doctrine and life, who are not identified with the church. The iron-nerved Puritan, Miles Standish, acquainted with the providence of God, helped to hew the forests, lived on bread crumbs, and a brave Indian warrior, but he held himself aloof from church fellowship. Time and space fails us to catalogue the many good people among our friends, out of Christ. The old song rings in our ears—

"What do you hope, dear brother,
To gain by a further delay?
There is none to save you but Jesus,
There is no other way but His way."

There is much good in confession of faith in Christ. Hear Jesus proclaiming: "He that confesseth Me before men, him will I confess before My Father." Martin Baale, who tried to be a secret disciple of Christ, wrote on a leaf which laid 100 years behind a stone in his chamber wall, these words: "Oh, merciful Christ, I know I can be saved only by the merits of Thy blood, Thou suffered for me—I love Thee." Afraid to confess Christ.

"Jesus and shall it ever be,
A mortal man ashamed of Thee?
Ashamed of Thee whom angels praise,
Whose glories shine through endless days?"

The church needs men of bright minds. Powerful intellects after fruitless research, like Noah's dove, will find rest only in God's saving institution, the church. Men should be in the church because of their influence upon boys. It is difficult to get the boy to church if father stays away. Men of affairs are needed in the kingdom. Mr. Heinz and Mr. Wanamaker, because men of influence in the business world, upon turning

their attention to Bible school work, pushed their home state to first place. Men of converted heart and of vision are needed. Men who can attend, teach and officer the church and manage a railroad, bank or store to pay expenses. This will help solve the boy and girl problem.

The church offers mutual help. It is a glorious privilege to be "workers together with God." We need each others prayers and tears. The word strength in Hebrew means "twisted"—as three cords make greater strength than one. "My strength is made perfect in weakness. His grace is sufficient for me." Moses promised Hobab that "what goodness the Lord shall do unto us the same will we do unto thee." We are glad that Hobab decided to journey with God's people, for in I. Sam., 15, Saul is told to kill Amalek, but the Kenites (Hobab's people) are warned and their lives spared for showing kindness to Israel in the wilderness. No right thinking man can afford to be left out of Christ's army. Could we be saved outside the church—think of the Christian service lost. God's way is best for He planned it all. The seemingly shortest route is not always the safest. The Titanic, in trying to cut off 300 miles from her course, met her doom among the icebergs. The dying words of Knoles Shaw were: "It is a glorious work to rally souls to the cross of Christ." Let us walk in God's way, for it is best.

How to Make Horses Acquainted With Automobiles

David Buffum, an expert on horses, writes as follows in the current issue of Farm and Fireside about teaching horses to have no fear of automobiles.

"If one lives near a road where automobiles are constantly passing the best thing to do is to tie such a horse securely to the roadside fence, if it is high enough to prevent him from jumping over it and strong enough to prevent him from breaking it. The halter, rope, and the post to which he is tied must also be strong. After standing there for several days he will be thoroughly accustomed to the passing of automobiles. If they pass with sufficient frequency he will become so used to them that he will eat his grain and scarcely notice them as they go by."

Resolution

Declaring the Intention of the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls to Improve Eighth Street from Main to High Street, High Street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth Street from High to Prospect; Prospect Street from Ninth to Upham; Upham Street from Prospect to White; White Street from Upham to Delta.

The City of Klamath Falls by its Common Council resolves:

Section One—That, Whereas, a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the Common Council having for its object the improvement of Eighth street from Main to High street; High street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth street from High to Prospect; Prospect street from Ninth to Upham; Upham street from Prospect to White; White street from Upham to Delta, including all intersections of streets.

And whereas, the Common Council directed the city engineer to prepare plans and specifications and estimates of the various kinds of improvements feasible for the proposed improvement of above described streets and parts thereof, and he having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the Common Council plans and specifications and estimates of cost of the proposed improvement, and these having been duly considered by the Common Council and found satisfactory.

Be it resolved, That the said plans and specifications are approved and

It is decided and determined, and the Common Council now expresses its determination to that end to improve said streets and parts thereof as described and set out herein with all macadam pavement.

Further, that the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering such proposed work are to be used as a basis for such work, and any contract for the construction of such improvement shall be based thereon, and the estimated cost of such work and improvement, as submitted by the city engineer as \$31,885 45, is adopted as the probable cost of said work and improvement.

Section two—The time within which remonstrances or objections may be heard against said improvement shall be on or before February 23, 1914.

Section three—The boundaries within which the property line that is benefited and is to be assessed for the cost of the said proposed improvement, is all that property lying adjacent to the said streets as far as improved and extending back from the side lines of said street to the center of the respective blocks lying adjacent to said streets so far as improved.

Section four—The notice to property owners affected by said improvement shall be given as required by the Charter.
