Pancho Villa and the men who remained with him now seem to be the strongest force in Mexico outside of President Huerta himself. The ex-bandit, who some weeks ago was merely one of the generals of the forces led by Provisional President Carranza, has by his numerous victories at Juarez, Chihuahua and Ojinakas, risen to over shadow his chief. For weeks Mexicans fighting Huerta have been anxious for the time when Villa and Carranza would get together for a concerted attack on Huerta, but so far there has been no move of this kind. There are now grave doubts if Villa will recognize the authority of Carranza.

Men familiar with the Mexican situation insist that Villa will now go it alone. If he does not feel strong enough to march on Mexico City, they believe, he will hold what he has in Chihuahua and adjacent territory and thus virtually set up a government of his own.

New Grain Rates Are Sought in Illinois

 SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 3.—Will Illinois' new public utilities commission in deciding grain freight rates continue to follow the Interstate Commerce Commission as it did in its rulings on the giving of passes and transportation and the fixing of express rates?

This was the question that today agitated farmers and grain shippers throughout Illinois when their representatives came here to plead before the state commission for the present freight tariffs as against a 1 per cent sliding increase.

Within the first month of its organization the commission adopted to the letter the federal board's classification of persons who may be granted

passes or transportation by carrier utilities and accepted the Interstate Commerce Commission's schedule of express tariffs for shipments within the state. What the railroads asked today was that the Interstate Commerce Commission's scale of grain rates be enforced for shipments within Illinois.

The railroads began clamoring for the grain freight increase a year ago. From time to time decision was deferred by the old railroad and warehouse commission.

When the first hearing was given by the commission, a postponement was allowed until today, with the proviso that whatever today's decision the rates asked should not go into effect until February 22.

Common Council resolves:

Section One—That, Whereas, a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the Common Council having for its object the improvement of Eight street from Main to High street; High street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth street from High to Prospect; Prospect street from Ninth to Upham; Upham street from Prospect to White; White street from Upham to Delta, including all intersections of streets.

And whereas, the Common Council directed the city engineer to prepare plans and specifications and estimates of the various kinds of improvements feasible for the proposed improvement of above described streets and parts thereof, and he having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the Common Council plans and specifications and estimates of cost of the proposed improvement, and these having been duly considered by the Common Council and found satisfactory.

Be it resolved, That the said plans and specifications are approved and it is decided and determined, and the Common Council now expresses its determination to that end to improve said streets and parts thereof as described and set out herein with oil macadam pavement.

Further, that the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering such proposed work are to be used as a basis for such work, and any contract for the construction of such improvement shall be based thereon, and the estimated cost of such work and improvement, as submitted by the city engineer at \$31,888.45, is adopted as the probable cost of said work and improvement.

Section two—The time within which remonstrances or objections may be heard against said improvement shall be on or before February 22, 1914.

Section three—The boundaries

within which the property lies that is benefited and is to be assessed for the cost of the said proposed improvement, is all that property lying adjacent to the said streets as far as improved and extending back from the side lines of said street to the center of the respective blocks lying adjacent to said streets so far as improved.

Section four—The notice to property owners affected by said improvement shall be given as required by the Charter.
