Polish-Americans Considering This

Polish National Council, Through Press Agencies, Is Telling World of Alleged Cruelties

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—Adopted American citizens who revere the names of Sobieski and Kosciuszko of their native land today are rapidly spreading in this country an organization which, under the title of the Polish National Council of America, has begun a vigorous warfare on alleged cruelties and brutalities inflicted on the people of dismembered Poland by their alien Russian, Prussian and Austrian rulers.

This organization has established a press bureau in Chicago, London, Paris, Rome, Bern, and Cracow, whence are issued statements of instances of mistreatment of Polish natives. The council collects funds and employs agents in many towns throughout Poland who secure data and information of specific acts of injustice and forward them to the nearest press bureau for use. The organization is being pushed and in time it is hoped to be able to frame an issue on which the sympathy of the entire civilized world will be appealed to on behalf of modern "bleeding Poland."

The latest bulletin issued by the Polish National Council discussed a move by the Russian government which strikes the deadliest blow off all at the maintenance of the Polish language in any part of Russian Poland.

During the last few years," says the bulletin, "a limited form of municipal government autonomy has been conceded to town in Russia, permitting elected representatives to deliberate on and decide questions of local interest. Later the former prime minister, M. Stolypin, desired to introduce the same thing in Poland, but his untimely death at the hands of an assassin delayed this measure until last year, when the duma passed a similar measure affecting Poland, and permitting the Poles to use their native tongue as an auxiliary language in their councils. On the 10th day of December, 1913, this bill was submitted to the Russian senate, where the ultra-nationalists, by a majority of 94 to 74, carried an amendment utterly prohibiting the use of the Polish language under any circumstances whatever.

"It must not be forgotten that an overwhelming majority of Polish councilors will thus be forced to deliberate in a language of which they are utterly ignorant. At the present time, since the exclusion of the province of Chelm (where a different system of municipal autonomy exists) there are hardly 110,000 Russians in Poland in a population of thirteen odd millions; that is, less than 1 per cent. Thus, for the convenience of one hundredth part of the population an unknown language is

forced upon the enormous majority of the people."

The council has collected figures of the population which prove that the Polish problem will not gradually fade through the disappearance of the Poles. The latest governmental censuses show the Poles number 11,804,129, a larger total than either Belgium, Romania, the Netherlands or Portugal has.

The Polish birth rate is astonishing, varying from 36.2 per thousand in Silesia to 39.5 in Posenia, 39.9 in Russian Poland. These rates contrast with 19.8 in France, 25.9 in Great Britain, 26 in Switzerland, 31.6 in Germany, 32.9 in Austria and 33.5 per thousand in Spain.

It is this remarkable increase in population, the council argues, which actuates Padrevski in calling on the Poles in Galicia to make some effort to retain control of business ventures and channels in their land. Padrevski, it is claimed, was not giving vent to anti-Semitic spirit in his utterance, but endeavored only to arouse the Polish spirit to dispute another item in their subjugation.

The Polish National Council of America, it was announced today, will soon establish an office at Washington, D. C., and an attempt will be made to interest the American people in the fight for freedom being made by this race, once the proudest in Europe.

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Oregon Will Have a Biological Exhibit

PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—William L. Finley, state game warden, is planning for the biological exhibit of the state of Oregon at the Panama-Pacific exposition, for which space in the official building of the state has been reserved. Oregon has more game left than any other state in the Union, according to Mr. Finley, and the state's exhibition will be most comprehensive in this respect.

Three fine specimens of the white tailed deer of the Cascade are being prepared for mounting by Stanley J. Jewett and O. J. Murie of the biological survey, being conducted under the auspices of the state game warden. Jewett and Murie have returned from Davis Lake and vicinity along the Upper Deschutes River in Crook county.

Two weeks was spent on the expedition and three deer, buck, doe and yearling, were secured. The snow was very deep, and going in, after their team had repeatedly become stalled, the hunters took to snow shoes.

The white tailed deer is an alien to this part of the country, his range being the Eastern states, along the Appalachian mountains. It is a mystery to scientists how the small, isolated herd reached Oregon. In addition to the deer, the hunters secured a number of other specimens, including animals and birds.

George H. Kelly, senior member of the state game and fish commission, has just returned from a hunt at the headwaters of the Willamette around Oak Ridge. He has been after wild cat and cougar, and secured a specimen of each. He was accompanied by Jasper Hills, the veteran hunter of Lane county, whom every big game Nimrod in the state knows.

Kelly declares that the deer in that

vicinity are increasing because of the good work being done in extermination of the cougar and cats. He says he counted more than fifty deer every day he was out, and Hills, who is making a systematic count of the deer in his vicinity, has found so far this year more than 300 head. The state is paying \$15 bounty on cougar, and great numbers of them, together with bobcats, have been killed this winter by the trappers and professional hunters over the state.

New Contract

That the work on the Pacific highway will soon commence is now assured. The delay has been caused by the financial entanglements of the firm of Keasal & McDowell, the original contractors of the grading over the Siskiyou. About two weeks after securing the contract the company was forced to go into the hands of a receiver because of losses on another contract. Several parties wanted to sub-contract it, but none of them had the financial backing satisfactory to the county court. Finally, however, the contract has been re-let at the bid of Keasal & McDowell to J. W. Sweetney, the prominent Portland contractor, who built the P. R. & N. railroad from Portland to Tillamook.—Ashland Tidings.

Resolution

Section One—That, Whereas, a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the Common Council having for its object the improvement of Eighth street from Main to High street; High street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth street from High to Prospect; Prospect street from Ninth to Upham; Upham street from Prospect to White; White street from Upham to Delta, including all intersections of streets.
