

Servant Reform Hits the National Capital

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6.—"An ignorant mistress makes an indolent servant."

Holding this truth to be self-evident the Housekeepers' Alliance of Washington has undertaken the education of its 200 members in household economics as a part of its general scheme to solve the servant problem, and incidentally keep the cost of living within reasonable bounds. It has organized a "reference circle," which will meet once a month. Here each member will bring her domestic problems for analysis, and the bride may learn from the experience of the woman who has celebrated her silver wedding.

"Eventually the alliance will establish a school for housekeeping, where girls, especially those from the country, will be trained as cooks, dining room girls and nurse girls," said Mrs. Gulon Miller, president of the organization, in an interview with a United Press correspondent today.

"In the meantime, however, we believe that the average wife and mother has much to learn in the way of proper management, and the reference circle was organized to meet this particular need. Its meetings are open to every woman interested in running a household, and its discussions are most informal."

One of the objects of the circle is to stop the abuse of "references" by servants. Every reference presented to a member of the circle is religiously followed up, and they have promised to issue no laudatory references to incompetents. A card index showing the records of several hundred girls is one of the features of this work.

The alliance also devotes much attention to retail grocers and butchers. It takes the position that the middleman is a necessity, but that his profits should be reasonable and his products clean and wholesome. Mrs. Harvey W. Wiley is one of the leading members of the alliance.

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., Feb. 6.—California's first women grand jurors, those of San Mateo county, like their work so well that they are going to keep it up, even if they must do so in an unofficial capacity. As a preliminary step, plans were completed today for the organization of a county committee of women to investigate everything that looks like it needs investigation.

The leader in the movement is Mrs. Racine McCroskey, who was a member of the jury. The other jurors are also included, as are many well known San Mateo county women, who had not the good fortune to serve on the inquisitorial body.

While the women's future investigations will be extra-legal, the leaders say they will be extremely thorough and that by the time they are concluded San Mateo county will be thoroughly purified. Judge Buck suggested such an organization when he discharged the jurors recently.

HOG RAISING IS GETTING MONEY

TWO MORE CARLOADS SHIPPED OUT THURSDAY TO CALIFORNIA POINTS—MEAT MEN SEE A GREAT FUTURE

Two carloads of hogs were shipped Thursday morning to San Francisco by Crisler & Stilts consigned to Miller & Lux. The shipment contained 206 porkers, bought by Crisler & Stilts from the farmers close around Klamath Falls.

In speaking of the hog raising industry in this country, Harry Stilts said this morning:

"We have shipped more than \$10,000 worth of hogs from Klamath Falls since the first of the year, not counting the two carloads just sent out."

When all the farmers find out that they can get the most for their grain by feeding it to hogs and selling the hogs, Klamath county will be one of the greatest hog raising counties in the state."

SUPREME COURT GIVES CITY POWER

the sale of intoxicating liquors the city is left as it was before any such election, with the power to prohibit the sale vested in the city. That power granted to the city, if there had been no local option election resulting in prohibition, is vested in the council in the first instance, but not to the exclusion of the people. That is a subject on which the municipality may legislate if it desires prohibition. When the council refuses to prohibit, the people may so provide by ordinance or in their charter, not as a local option proceeding, but as an initiative measure.

"The local option law was enacted before we had in the cities the power of legislation by initiative. With that power, prohibition can be as readily adopted therein as by local option, and that method is not in any way inconsistent with or in violation of the proceedings by local option."

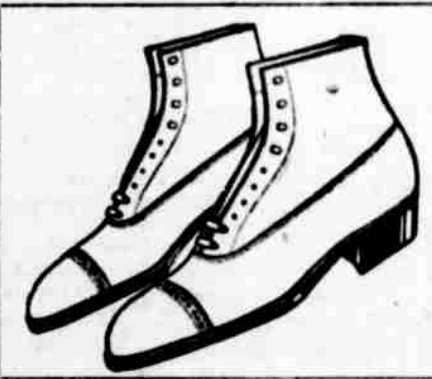
