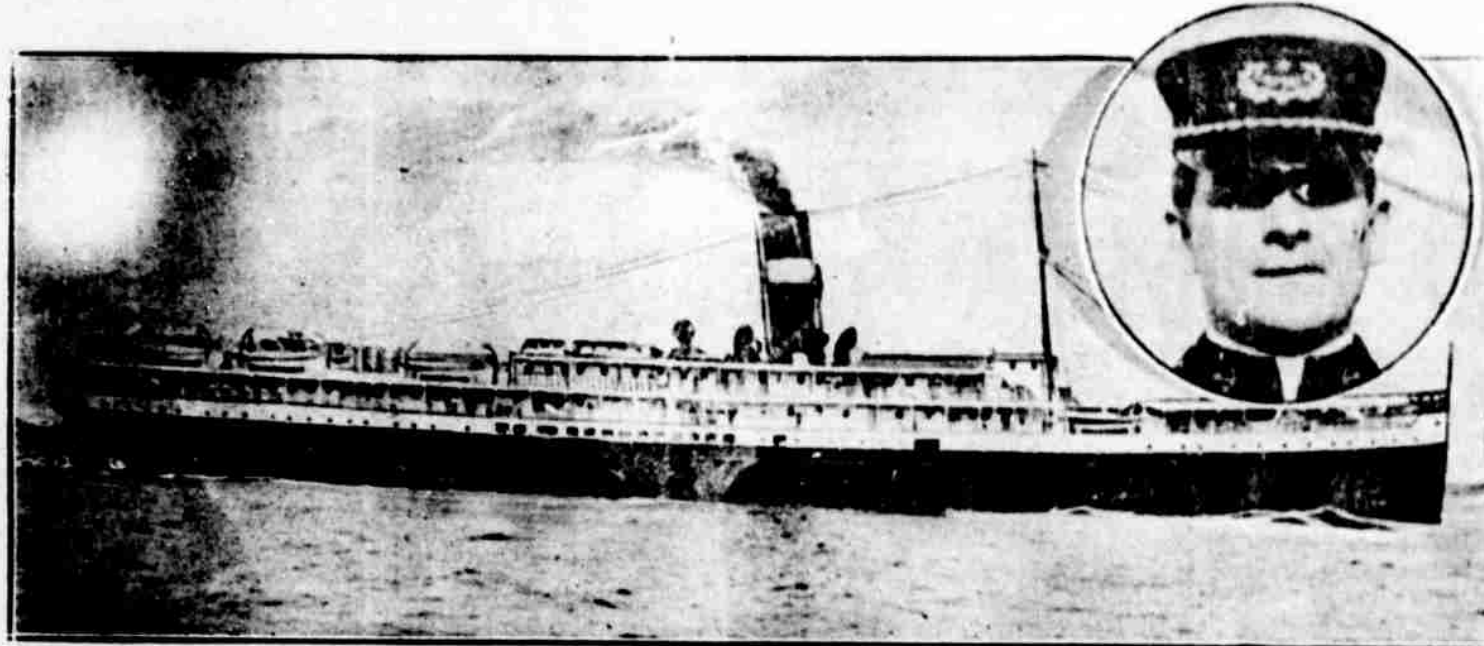

Forty-four persons were lost when the Old Dominion liner Monroe, said to be the staunchest vessel of the company, went down off the Winter Quarter Shoals lighthouse on the Virginia coast. She was rammed by the smaller steamer Nantucket of the Merchants & Miners Steamship company. The Monroe was on her way from Norfolk to New York, while the Nantucket was headed from Boston to Baltimore. The vessel went down during a heavy fog. Captain Johnson, going very slowly, had brought his vessel to a standstill when he heard the signals from the Nantucket. Both vessels were blowing warning signals when they collided. The ac-

MORE GOLD FOUND IN KANSAS COUNTY

FOLLOWING YESTERDAY'S FIND OF BURIED TREASURE INRUSH OF GOLD HUNTERS IS FEARED BY THE NATIVES

LAUREL, Kan., Feb. 7.—Gold hunters estimated to be worth \$20,000 is reported to have been found in Hodgeman county.

The first discovery was made yesterday when \$6,800 worth was found. How the gold came to be there is a mystery, but the accepted explanation is that it was buried by returning Colorado miners about 1865, during an Indian massacre. It is reported that about \$900,000 in gold was buried at that time in the vicinity of Jettmore.

An influx of gold seekers is feared, and the ranchers are guarding their land.
