PARIS, Feb. 10.—A tax on all-night resorts here today was formally proposed by M. Brunet to the municipal council, a heavy tax to be levied on such cabarets as those of Montmartre, popular with Americans and other foreigners, while those about the Central Markets, where night laborers refresh themselves, would be exempt.

MAINTENANCE OF PRICES TALKED

IMPORTANT SESSION OF THE NATIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE—HUNDREDS OF DELEGATES ARE PRESENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10.—Price maintenance was expected to be the most important subject under discussion today at the opening sessions of the annual meeting of the National Chamber of Commerce of the United States at the Hotel Willard.
Directors of the National Chamber decided at their last meeting held at Rochester on December 10th that the matter of price maintenance, because it falls within the scope of anti-trust legislation, should be discussed by the National Chamber as a whole.
The meeting will continue tomorrow and Thursday. Several hundred delegates from all sections of the country are in attendance.

New Creamery
Gladis and Dixon have sold their creamery business to W. L. Chappell, formerly of Oakville, Oregon, an experienced creamery man, who will establish a new and up-to-date plant in the Medford creamery building next to the Nat. New machinery valued at \$1,000 is now on the road, including a cream ripener, modern churn with a capacity of 550 gallons and butter-print cutter. The new plant will have a capacity of 2,000 pounds of butter a day.—Medford Sun.

Candidates Grooming
Although the time is approaching for the candidates to begin "shying their hats into the ring," as it were, up to this time there are but two avowed candidates in the field for offices in Lake county. Those who have declared themselves thus far are W. B. Snider, present sheriff, and F. W. Payne, present incumbent in the clerk's office.—Lake County Examiner.

To Move Mill
A very important business deal was consummated here when R. E. L. Heddlon, manager of the Haddon woolen mills, signed a contract with the Coos Bay Townsite company, whereby the woolen mills now stationed at Haddon will be moved to Cooston, on Coos Bay. The latter site is owned by the Coos Bay Townsite company, many of the stockholders of which are local capitalists.—Roseburg News.

No Homes About It
Upon the motion of Councilman Sargent at the council meeting, the ordinance amendment passed by the former administration allowing card and dice games in local hotels was repealed, and a new ordinance adopted making these diversions illegal in the city. It was also decided to compel pool and bowling alleys in the city to close at midnight each night, in conformity with the present saloon ordinance.—Medford Sun.

Douglas in Films
Piloted by Verne Buell, one of Roseburg's best known "buckaroos," three representatives of one of the large moving picture syndicates, left here for the Cape Illihee country, where they will secure interesting photographs of the "Wild West." The men are equipped with a complete camping outfit, and expect to spend several days in the Illihee country, where they will find many interesting subjects for films. On their return from Illihee the gentlemen will secure numerous views dealing with Roseburg and the immediate vicinity.—Roseburg News.

More Exports
At the request of the Medford Sun, J. H. Bulchay of the Southern Pacific has compiled statistics showing the exact status of the balance of trade in the Rogue River Valley from Grants Pass to Ashland for 1913, as far as carload shipments are concerned. The balance in favor of the valley was 1,175 cars, but this would be materially increased if the express shipments in eggs, berries and small fruit could be added.—Medford Sun.

Hum Magin'
The stages in all directions have been having a hard time to make their trips the past week. Frank Harbert has put snowshoes on the horses between Bear Flat and Bartle, and it is reported that they are working well. Frank has to overcome almost insuperable obstacles in opening the road to Bartle, as will be understood when it is known that the snow is twelve to eighteen feet in depth.—Adin Argus.

Want Quiet Sunday
For some time past the people of Alturas have been gradually becoming favorably inclined towards the Sunday closing of all places of business, and petitions are being prepared and signed, asking that the town board of trustees adopt an ordinance to that effect.—Alturas New Era.

Train Service Resumed
Delayed train service between here and Reno was partially resumed Saturday with the arrival of a train bringing in considerable mail and express matter that had been held up at Reno for over a week on account of washouts of the N.C.-O. track. Another train reached here on Monday night, and the next one getting in at 4:30 a. m. Thursday. It was necessary to transfer yesterday over the damaged track below Doyle.—Lake County Examiner.

LINE COLERAINE, Mass., Feb. 10.—With democrats all over the country demanding political plums in the shape of jobs, and many of the jobs wanted being postmasterships, Mrs. Addie A. Upton today was rejoicing over the fact that she won a bitter fight with the government, to be permitted to resign her job here as postmistress. Mrs. Upton spent her last day as postmistress today.

Some months ago Mrs. Upton sent in her resignation to Postmaster General Burleson. She had no idea but what it would be accepted immediately. But Burleson, strange as it may seem in these days of importuning job-seekers, actually refused to accept the resignation.
Then began a fight by Mrs. Upton to be permitted to fire herself.

She had the help in congress of Representative Treadway of Massachusetts. Even then it took her six months to win.

During that period of warfare the government made a desperate effort to get someone to succeed Mrs. Upton. But in no nook or cranny of the Great Bay State could one be found who would take over the responsibility.
