The photograph caught Thomas H. Taggart, democratic boss in Indiana, in a striking pose. Mr. Taggart is a candidate for the United States senate. That is, his name will be placed before the democratic convention at Indianapolis March 19th. Taggart must fight Senator B. F. Shively, who won an important place in the United States senate in the time he has been there.

In the campaign of Alton B. Parker for the presidency, Taggart was the chairman of the national democratic committee. He has been a member of the committee since, but he has not occupied such an important position in the party since.

Says Star Routes May Be Cut Down

(Herald Special Service)

PORTLAND, Feb. 12.—That there is danger of attempted reduction of star route service in various sections of Oregon is the warning note contained in a letter recently received here from former Senator Jonathan Bourne, who advises that prompt protest should be made against any such move. This is a matter of interest, particularly to Eastern Oregon and Coast counties having much star route mail service.

As everyone knows, the adoption of the parcel post resulted in enormous increase in the amount of mail, especially for delivery within short distances. The government is now considering bids for new star route contracts, and it is certain that the compensation asked by bidders will far exceed the amounts paid in the past.

It is anticipated that in an effort at economy the department will either postpone the letting of new contracts or will reduce the frequency of service from daily mail to three times a week or from three times a week to twice a week or once a week, or, in some instances, discontinue the service altogether.

In his parcel post bill, Senator Bourne provided for eight zone distances. The bill also authorized the postmaster general, when experience demonstrated the desirability, and with the approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission, after investigation, to reduce the rates and increase the weight limits. In making reductions, the department established the same rate for the 150 mile zone as for the 50 mile zone. This gave patrons of long star routes a rate that is below the freight rate, thus throwing into the mails much matter that would ordinarily be hauled in freight wagons.

Senator Bourne takes the view that the original 50 mile and 150 mile zones should have been retained, with rates that will be self supporting, and that if the department made a mistake in establishing one rate for the

two distances, it should not try to avoid the consequences by reducing or discontinuing service. He contends that people who have gone out on the frontier to make their homes and develop the latent resources of the country are entitled to such encouragement and assistance as the government can give in the matter of mail service, and says that patrons of star routes should not consent to any diminution of service on account of any unwise acts of the administrative officers of the government.

Senator Bourne's letter is the first intimation received here that there is danger of delay in letting contracts or probability of effort to curtail service. It will serve to place the people of Oregon on their guard.

New Financial Game Is Given Some Publicity

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A hoax that deserves to rank with Barnum's "Cardiff giant" and Dr. Cook's mental discovery of the north pole has just called forth a warning from the treasury department to credulous investors generally. It concerns a most alluring story of \$64,644,000 in railroad bonds, with accrued interest since 1864, supposed to be gathering dust in Uncle Sam's strong box and awaiting to be distributed among the heirs of Charles Durkee, one time senator from Wisconsin, and territorial governor of Utah, who died in 1870.

More than ten years after Durkee's death, Leonard C. Blaisdell, his nephew by marriage, conceived the idea that the former senator had at one time bought up an entire bond issue of first mortgage bonds of the Pacific railroads and had them turned over to the United States to guarantee completion of a transcontinental rail line. Colonel F. A. Reeve, acting solicitor for the treasury department, believes that Blaisdell was merely suffering from some sort of hallucination, but since that time his story has been used to sell "stock" in the visionary claim. Blaisdell has not been heard of in Washington for years and officials here believe he is dead.

To give color to their scheme, the promoters at one time brought suit in the federal courts of Utah, but it was thrown out of court and in sustaining the lower tribunal on an appeal, Federal Judge Phillips said:

"A syndicate of promoters was formed. They devised the scheme of selling shares of stock in the chances of success. It was represented that if the suit were won the result would be over \$200,000,000 for division among the shareholders. These agents accordingly disposed of some shares at the proportion of fifty for \$1 in money, and when the bait failed they offered the still more alluring temptation of 100 shares for \$1 in money, and the evidence shows that they succeeded in drawing from their dupes about \$50,000."

For years after this there was nothing more heard of the claim, but Colonel Reeve has learned that some more 50 to 1 chances are being offered and that one man recently parted with \$1,900 to the promoters.

Though the names of these promoters are not made public, it is said that they represent that they are working for a contingent fee of 50 percent of the money recovered and need a few thousand dollars to carry on the case. They also tell that Secretary McVeigh admitted the claim and was ready to sign "the papers," but that his term expired while he was looking for his pen.

As a matter of truth, no such bonds were ever in the treasury. Furthermore, Durkee was far from wealthy, and nowhere in his will or other papers make mention of any swollen fortune he had placed in the hands of the government.
