

## Find Bottle of Wine 226 Years Old--Some Flavor

BERLIN, Feb. 16.—A bottle of 226 year old wine, which was discovered hidden away in a long forgotten cellar of a Naumburg vineyard, was solemnly uncorked in the presence of the state horticulturist and the leading citizens of Naumburg recently. The wine, which had been laid down in the year 1687, proved on examination to have a marvellously delicate bouquet and at the same time to be of surprising vigor. A very little was sufficient to impart to a glass of new Naumburg wine the same bouquet and character. As only a small quantity was found, the wine is literally worth its weight in gold, and the testing of it partook something of the nature of a sacred religious rite.

## Hog Cholera Costs Iowa Farmers Thirty Millions

AMES, Ia., Feb. 16.—Hog cholera in Iowa cost the farmers \$33,000,000 in 1913. Nearly 2,000,000 hogs died of the disease, and experts say this is nearly 25 percent of the total number. The loss to Iowa farmers was two and a half times as great as during 1912, despite the efforts of the state and federal government to stamp out the disease. These estimates are based on reports from 1139 different men covering every community in every county in the state, as compiled by Director W. J. Kennedy of the state agricultural college extension department. Dr. C. H. Stange, director of the state serum laboratory, gathered statistics which showed that when healthy hogs were treated the loss after treatment was less than 2-3 percent. When sick hogs were treated the loss was between 16 and 17 percent. But in many sections of the state serious results followed the use of good virus and poor serum. Experts say that provision must be made for the thorough testing of all serum, under either state or federal authority, before it can be sold.

## WOMAN LAWYER HELPS SISTERS

LOS ANGELES FEMALE CITY OFFICIAL GIVES THREE DAYS IN EACH WEEK TO TROUBLES OF OTHER WOMEN

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—Women should have a definite place in the legal department of every city, according to Deputy City Prosecutor Marguerite Gardner, who devotes three days of each week unraveling legal troubles for perplexed women. Miss Gardner believes that women, in spite of their enfranchisement here, are unable to protect themselves legally; that the average woman has an abnormally developed and often misplaced bump of confidence in mankind, that after many centuries of association with women, man is usually unable to get her viewpoint; that the first duty of a lawyer is to keep a client out of legal difficulties.

"Therefore," said Miss Gardner, "women are hereafter cordially invited to keep out of trouble by coming to me with contracts and other legal matters before executing them. I shall try to juggle prevention from my office instead of attempting impossible cures."

## HOG MARKET IS STILL STRONGER

MONDAY'S RECEIPTS OF CATTLE WERE LARGEST OF WHOLE WEEK—SHEEP ACTIVE FIRST OF WEEK.

PORTLAND, Feb. 16.—In the cattle division the bulk of the best grain fed steers offering sold at from \$7.70 to \$7.85 and one load brought \$8.00. Not much choice hay fed stock was in evidence.

Butcher cattle trade was firm only for cows, of which there was a liberal showing. The best ones realized \$6.50 to \$6.75, with the usual discount on lesser grades.

Bulls sold up to \$5.60 and were unsold. Receipts were large Monday, when more stuff arrived than the total for the other five days.

The swine market not only maintained firmness but strengthened its position 5 to 10 cents. Several hundred choice light hogs brought \$8.60 during the first three days, but the bulk was an \$8.50 to \$8.55 affair.

Killers from all over the Northwest were in the yards for hogs, and business was extremely brisk. The close was steady to firm, \$8.50 to \$8.60.

Sheep house transactions were confined mostly to Monday and Tuesday. Good grain weathers were scarce, but a liberal offering of ewes selling at from \$3.50 to \$4.75, according to quality, prevented stagnation in the mutton department.

The lamb market was steady to stronger this week with best quality selling, off cars, at \$6.75. Receipts were not so large as a week ago.

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## A New Spring Gown From Paris



This is just one of the Paris hints of spring fashions. There are many more. It is by Paquin, the French designer of costumes for women, and is known as a new print of mandarin crepe.

The color is dark blue, trimmed with maroon satin, which makes a charming color combination. Several striking features are introduced. The three tier skirt with Van Dyke points slows the continuance of the tiered effect and the discontinuance of the straight around hem. The back droop of the sash adds to the general pulled up effect in front and the tendency to short waistedness. The shape of the collar, longer and looser over the back and shoulders and very short in front, shows a corresponding effect.

With the exception of the narrowness of the skirt proper around the foot, the whole gown gives an effect of looseness. The skirt tiers, blouse, and sleeves are all decidedly full, but

more so to the back than front. This seems to be a feature in all of the new models. The narrowness of the skirt tiers, tunics or peplums toward the front is so pronounced that an almost skimpy effect is given, while the effect from the back is quite the opposite and decidedly voluminous.

With the gown of the sketch was worn a hat by Virot, of maroon straw, the color of the sash and collar. The only trimming is a bow of ribbon at the left side of the same shade. As will be noted, the hat is worn at a slight angle. The smartness of these little hats, which are to be worn a great deal this spring, depends very much upon the angle at which they are worn. If they are not tilted the least bit, in most cases coming a little further down over the right eye than the left, the chic effect is lost.

## American Ambassador Holds Italian Ceremony

ROME, Feb. 16.—Ambassador Nelson Page is in imminent peril of being awarded a Carnegie hero medal. At the recent meeting of the Italian branch of the Carnegie Foundation, Ambassador Page was elected president. Although he had been in Italy but two months, he insisted on conducting the entire business of the meeting in Italian and got away with it so well that at the close his Italian conferees unanimously decided that at the next sitting they would present to him his own name for an award.

The commission for the first time in Italy awarded a gold medal with \$200 in cash. This went to Dr. Pietro Folanini. While performing a difficult operation on a woman to save her from blood poisoning, Dr. Folanini found that she must inevitably suffocate from the blood that flowed from the wound into her throat and lungs. Placing his mouth over the wound he sucked away the infected blood until the hemorrhage ceased and he could proceed with the operation. Several bronze and silver medals were also awarded for acts of bravery in connection with life saving.
