Gossip of Washington Circles

'Battling' Johnson Not Society Favorite

Maryland Senator Sets New Record—This Is for the Smallest Amount of Mileage Ever Given a Lawmaker

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—"Battling Ben" Johnson, representative from Kentucky, and known to fame because of his near-fist fights and his self-confessed proclivity for "toting a gun," is not extremely popular with society folk here. Also the real estate agents just positively shudder when they hear his name. It's all because Johnson delved deep into musty tomes and discovered a precedent whereby he insists that the District of Columbia ought to pay all its city expenses, instead of saddling the federal government with half of them, as has been the case for nearly a third of a century.

Johnson, being a democrat, and naturally a bug for the democrat economy stuff, has been making the rich society folks and the real estate shake in their several boots pretty nearly every day since that time by pushing his scheme ahead. He is the chairman of the house committee which legislates for the city of Washington, too, and that means he is in a position to make his recommendations carry weight. He holds that the tax rate here is entirely too low, and that by making the rich society swell who own fine homes which they occupy during the "season," pay more taxes, matters will be evened up.

The old "half-and-half" plan was adopted because the government owned so much property here in parks, government buildings and reservations, it was thought Uncle Sam ought to pay half of the District's expenses. Johnson would have the government pay some. But he insists this should not be half of the city's expenses.

Naturally residents of Washington are fighting the Johnson plan as hotly as imaginable. Johnson continually receives threatening letters every so often. Therefore the pistol pocket and the determination to go ahead with his ideas, no matter what happens.

President Wilson has such a fondness for "action" in the drama that he frequently annoys society by popularizing a playhouse here that is distinctly unfashionable. It is occupied by a stock company, which plays nice, thrills shows. During the summer folks thought the president's weekly attendance was because there wasn't any other show house open, but now that all the other theaters are running, they've discovered that it's a matter of preference. Audiences have discovered that the president gets an immense amount of

enjoyment out of villains and heroes in lurid climaxes. He sits at the edge of his box, and just absorbs the play.

"Alfalfa Bill" Murray, representative from Oklahoma, was showing some constituents of his around Washington the other day. They had walked weary miles through the treasury and the bureau of engraving buildings, and finally arrived at the Washington monument. Murray led off with a grand little lecture about the big pile. A policeman got so interested in some of Murray's facts (?) about it that when the congressman finished the policeman's nose was right over the Oklahoma's shoulder. "Some little talk, wasn't it?" Alfalfa Bill queried.

"Oh, yeh," negligently retorted the bluecoat. "But you forgot about the cat."

"What cat?" demanded Murray. "The brindled cat of 1896." "Well, what about him?" demanded Bill, hot under the collar. "Oh, nothing."

"See here, you tell that story," shouted Bill. The minion of the law moved away a little distance. "It ain't much of a story," he began. "This here cat lived in the monument. Me and another chap under notice that anmiled acted strange-like every time a party came along and told about the 'be-e-you-ties of this vast pile of granite,' as you was a-sayin'. Then one day along came a gent and talked for three-quarters of an hour along that there line. I'll be blamed if that there cat didn't run all the way up 500 feet of steps and commit suicide by jumpin' off the monument." And before Bill could recover the bluecoat was a faint blue spot on the horizon.

Senator Blair Lee, Maryland's newest solon, broke a senate record by receiving the smallest amount of "mileage" pay ever given any sena-

tor. He has been paid just \$3.20 for expenses in traveling to and from Washington. Mileage allowances of Pacific Coast members run over \$1,200. Senator Lee got such a slim allowance because he lives only eight miles from Washington, on a farm at Silver Spring, Md., just beyond the District of Columbia-Maryland line. Twenty cents a mile for the round trip is the travel pay allowed senators. Lee travels to and from Washington by trolley.

Former Senator Arthur P. Gorman of Maryland formerly held the record for small travel pay. Representative Carlin, living at Alexandria, Va., seven miles from here, receives the smallest mileage allowance in the house.

Our Weekly Health Letter

Obesity, Its Cause and Cure—Where the Excess of Fat Comes From and How It May Be Removed and Prevented.

Editor's Note—We have arranged with Dr. R. R. Daniels, the well known writer on health subjects, to contribute to this paper a series of practical articles on health and body care; one article to appear each week.

The fat of the body always comes from a single source, the food. Fat is food which has been digested, but which cannot be used by the tissues. Regardless of whether the fat man may be a light eater or a heavy eater, he always eats and digests more food than his body uses up. Nature, in her economy, saves this excess by storing it in the form of fat. Alcoholic drinks, especially in the form of beer, often overload the body with an undesirable kind of fat.

The Fat Producers

While an excess of any food may be converted into fat in the body, the sweets and the starches, such as breads of every kind, cereals and potatoes, are the usual sources of fat. It is of those things that the fat man always eats more than he needs.

The Results of Obesity

Foods which make fat are force-producing foods under normal conditions, but as the body gets into the habit of converting these foods into fat the individual loses vigor. Further, too, much fat overworks the heart, overstrains the arteries and tends to bring on degeneration of the kidneys. Early death from worn out organs is the fate of the average fat man. The obese also have a diminished disease resisting power. Typhoid fever and pneumonia are particularly fatal among fat people.

How to Cure Obesity

The only rational method to cure obesity, and, incidentally, the only safe cure, is, first, to reduce the amount of force food to just what can be used in the body and, second, to get the body into the habit of using up more food, and out of the lazy

habit of converting the food into fat. This means, first, that the fat man should eat a sufficient small amount of starchy foods to permit a constant reduction in weight until this is done to normal; and second, that he should get plenty of fresh air night and day, wear light clothing, especially underwear, take a daily sponge bath, and follow systematic exercise.
