IS YOUR INCOME REPORT SENT IN?

Only Ten More Days to Comply With
the Law; the Herald Has a Number
of Blanks for Free Distribution to
Those Who Will Call for Them

There has been some complaint in
Klamath Falls that people have not
been supplied with the blanks neces-
sary to make their income reports to
Collector M. A. Miller. For the bene-
fit of these, the Herald has secured
a number of the blanks, which will
be given to those calling for them.

But ten more days remain in which
to file the income tax statement. The
statements must be in the hands of
the internal revenue collector by
March 1.

There is a penalty ranging from
\$20 to \$1,000 for failure to make the
return and a fine not to exceed \$2,000
and a prison term not to exceed one
year for those who make a false or
fraudulent return.

Every person who had a net in-
come of \$2,500 in 1913, from March
1 to December 31 must make a re-
turn. A single person for 1913 is
allowed an exemption of \$2,500 and
a married person an exemption of
\$3,333.33.

Hereafter returns must be made
when the net income is \$3,000 a year,
with the single people having an ex-
emption of \$2,000 and married per-
sons an exemption of \$4,000.

Those subject to the income tax
have until June 30 to make payment.
Personal checks will not be accepted,
the payment must be made in cer-
tified check, draft or money order.

Partnerships, as such, are not re-
quired to make returns, but the mem-
bers comprising the firm must make
returns if their individual incomes
reach \$2,000, or \$3,500 for 1913.

Lots of "Soil" to "Go Back to" Wants a Joint Lincoln-Washington Observance

Nearly a Billion Acres of Virgin Land

Department of Agriculture Announces That Less Than a
Third of Our Tillable Land Is Under the Plow

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8. — The
"back to the soil" movement still has
plenty of room to grow, according to
figures just made public by the de-
partment of agriculture, which show
that there are today 833,000,000
acres of tillable land in the United
States which has never been turned
by a plow. In fact, only 27 percent
of the land of this country capable of
being farmed is now under cultiva-
tion. The remaining 73 percent does
not include 61,000,000 acres which
are non-tillable but valuable for pas-
ture or fruit growing.

The most thoroughly cultivated
states are Illinois and Iowa, where for
every acre tilled there is 1.6 untilled.
Indiana is next with a ratio of one to
1.8; in New York it is one acre tilled
to 2.4 untilled, and that proportion
is general throughout New England.
Arizona has the greatest proportion
of untilled land, having 76.7 avail-
able acres idle for every acre on
which crops are now raised. In New
Mexico it is one to 31.2; in Nevada
one to 28.3 and in Montana one to
25. California's rating shows one to
6.1.

The entire United States, excluding
foreign territory, contains about 1-
900,000,000 acres. Of this about 60
percent, or 1,114,000,000 acres, is
estimated to be tillable, including that
which, though not tillable at present,
may be made so by clearing, irriga-
ting or draining. About 19 per-
cent is fit only for fruit or forage
crops and 21 percent will probably
never be of any use from an agricul-
tural standpoint.

An extensive study of methods of
preventing the shrinkage of cattle
shipped on the hoof has just been con-

cluded by the department of agricul-
ture. The methods promise to save
hundreds of dollars to the farmers
and stockraisers. Heretofore it has
not been uncommon for a steer to
reach the stockyards weighing from
sixty to seventy-five pounds less than
when it left the farm, but by proper
feeding this may be materially re-
duced.

In 265 shipments of cattle, com-
prising 19,000 head, the loss ranged
from 2.14 to 7 percent, depending on
the length of the time the cattle were
enroute, the treatment they received
enroute, and what they had in their
stomachs when they started. Steers
show less shrinkage than cows, but
the difference is not as great as many
shippers suppose.

"If cattle are to be in transit
twenty-four hours or longer, it is a
good plan to feed about two bales of
nice bright hay for each carload a
few hours before loading," is the ad-
vice of the department. "There is
no way of entirely preventing shrink-
age, but by judicious care in the
handling and feeding the cattle just
previous to shipping the shrinkage
may be lessened. The shrinkage of
fed cattle does not differ greatly from
that of range cattle fed for equal
periods of time. Cattle fed on silage
have a large gross shrinkage, but
usually 'fill' so well when fed at the
market that the net shrinkage is
small. Pulp fed cattle shrink more in
transit than any other class of cattle
and also show a greater net shrink-
age. For a long journey the common
method of unloading for feed, water
and rest is preferred to the use of
'feed and water' cars."

Americans should not cele-
brate the birthdays of Washing-
ton and Lincoln separately but
should make a joint celebration
of both on a day devoted espe-
cially to fostering the patriotism
of America's foreign born citi-
zens. This is the point of view
of Dr. Clarkson N. Guyer, who
is responsible for the inaugura-
tion of such a celebration in
Denver on the evening of Febru-
ary 20th. This will be the first
celebration of the kind in the
United States and its promoters
hope that it will be followed by
similar observances in other
American cities next year. Gov-
ernor Elias M. Ammons, of Col-
orado, is one of the enthusiastic
supporters of Dr. Guyer's idea.
Dr. Guyer, discussing the cele-
bration, gave the United Press
the following exclusive state-
ment today.

DENVER, Feb. 18.—Denver plans

to evoke the patriotism of all her
many-nationed residents, upon the
joint celebration of the birthdays of
the men highest in America's hall of
fame—Washington and Lincoln. Un-
der state and city officials, at the
initiative of her revolutionary so-
cieties, in her city auditoriums, on a
suitable week-night between the
birthdays, all the societies of her for-
eign-born residents are invited to join
in expressing the common underlying
patriotism, each in its typical and fa-
miliar manner, all joining at the con-
clusion, whether guest or not, in salu-
tating the flag beneath whose folds
all follow after peace.
