Ten Commandments for Teachers Is Out

BOULDER, Colo., Feb. 19.—"Ten commandments" for teachers have laid down by Professor Frank E. Thompson of the chair of education of the University of Colorado, to students who are preparing to take up teaching as a profession.

In an address explaining his commandments he classified some teachers as "a mob of mobile maidens meditating matrimony." He further declared that no teacher should apply for any position unless it has been declared vacant. Here are his "commandments":

- 1.—Poor teachers should not receive positions as long as there are better teachers.
- 2.—More expert teachers should be given the more difficult positions.
- 3.—Individual genius of the teacher should fit the particular requirements for the position.
- 4.—All teachers should be put where they can do the most good.
- 5.—Change of position is subject

to three requirements: (a) the good of the school which the teacher is leaving; (b) the good of the school to which she is going; (c) the good of the teacher herself.

6.—Personal and political pull must be eliminated.

7.—All teachers of equivalent ability should be kept in close competition.

8.—Methods should be such as to bring an upward impetus in salaries.

9.—A teacher should never have her own testimonials.

10.—Superintendents should not get rid of "undesirables" by writing them good testimonials.

CROOK COUNTY HAS TROUBLES

Governor Is Asked to Send Force to Prineville to Help Recover County Tax Rolls—Sheriff and Janitor Accused of Stealing Book.

SALEM, Feb. 19.—Governor West has received a message from G. Springer, county judge of Crook county, stating that the sheriff has taken the tax roll and is refusing to return it, and inquiring if the executive will come to his aid, should the sheriff refuse to obey the court order commanding the return of the roll. Judge Springer's wire follows:

"Expert accountants are at Prineville, upon the order of the county court, to go over the tax roll. Last night the sheriff, after hours, with the assistance of the janitor, entered the circuit court room and swiped the tax roll, and is refusing to return it. I have asked the circuit court for an order commanding the sheriff to return it. If the sheriff should refuse to obey the order will you give me assistance in enforcing the law. I am in earnest in this matter for the fact that the expert shows that a large sum in delinquent taxes has been paid to the treasurer since this work was commenced."
