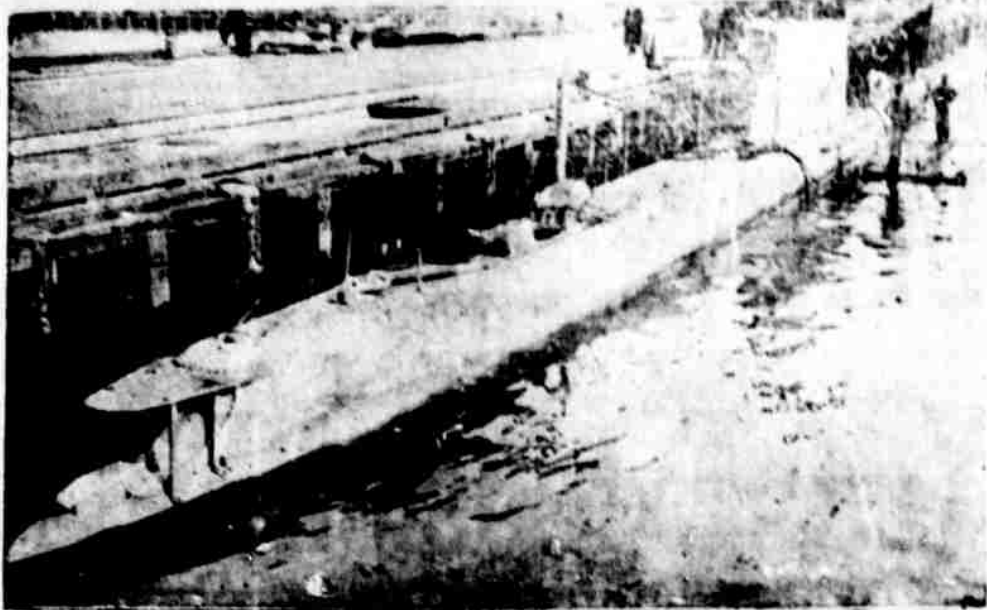

Plant Food Values Are Being Studied at "U"

EUGENE, Feb. 20.—A study of the value of the different plant foods is the purpose of the new course offered at the University this semester by Professor A. R. Sweetser, under the name of pure foods. It may better be called economic botany.

Professor Sweetser intends to take up an analysis of the most important foods which figure in every day consumption, and the first step will be to obtain a knowledge of dairy economy in order to give those interested an understanding of what is required of an up-to-date dairy farm.

Milk samples will be brought from the different dairies and tested as to butter fat and bacteria.

Different kinds of flour will be experimented upon to find out the rela-

tive values of the different grades of hard and soft wheat flour.

Yeasts and baking powders will be analyzed, and their ingredients will be found and accounts taken of their impurities.

Coffees, teas, spices and all kinds of flavoring extracts, along with the different oils, will be studied. How to preserve and a study of different preserve samples, will also be included in the course.

"The main thing in this course is to discover the different food values of the plant foods," said Professor Sweetser. "People today are interested in trying to solve the high cost of living, and I intend this course to give an economical account of living which will enable people to get the best values for their money."
