DOMESTIC SCIENCE CLASS FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL MAKES A THOROUGH INVESTIGATION AT PEOPLE'S MARKET

The young ladies were conducted through the smoke house, where meats are cured by smoke from burning mahogany; through the packing house, where shoulders, hams and bacon are trimmed for shipping, and into the sausage room, where the meats are ground and made into links. In the cutting rooms, Paul Lucas dissected a shoat to demonstrate the proper way to separate hams, shoulders, bacon, spareribs, etc.

Joe Konop cut a side of beef for the benefit of the young ladies, showing how to cut without wasting any meat.

Many questions were asked and notes made of the replies, and these same questions will be asked by Miss Carpenter at some future time to see to what extent the class profited by their observations.

BECKER MAY GET ANOTHER TRIAL

FORMER POLICE LIEUTENANT THINKS SLAYER OF GAMBLER ROSENTHAL IS STILL AT LIBERTY

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Former Lieutenant of Police Becker, in an interview published in the New York World today, says that he believes the slayer of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler who was supposed to be giving evidence to the prosecutor's office, is still at large. As this murderer he names one of the witnesses in the trial of the four gun men now confined in Sing Sing, awaiting the death penalty.

Becker said: "I haven't the proof now, but I believe he is the slayer of Rosenthal. According to his own testimony he was drunk that night, and did not remember what happened. I feel sorry for these boys in the death house."

The movement toward securing a new trial for Becker has apparently been successful.

SOCIAL SESSIONS CUT AT U. OF O.

NEW FACULTY RULING FORBIDS ANY SOCIAL AFFAIRS AT ANY OF THE HOUSES ON ANY OF THE SCHOOL SESSIONS DAYS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON Eugene, Feb. 25.—The printed rules and regulations of the Student Affairs committee, that were distributed around to the various houses at the beginning of the second semester, and were thought to be the same as the previous rules, have just been discovered to be slightly different in regard to two of the restrictions, namely:

"There shall be no social affairs, either formal or informal, from Monday morning until Friday at 3 p. m., inclusive, except under special permission of the committee."

The other new rule was as follows: "Not more than two formal social affairs shall be held by one organization during any one semester."
