Summons
In the Circuit Court of the State of
Oregon, for Klamath County.
Emma R. Grigsby, Plaintiff,
vs.
Frank Irish, Defendant.

To Frank Irish, the above named de-
fendant:
In the name of the state of Oregon,
you are hereby required to appear
and answer the complaint filed
against you in the above entitled suit
on or before Saturday, the 7th day
of March, 1914, that being the last
day of the time prescribed in the or-
der of publication of this summons,
and if you fail so to appear and an-
swer, for want thereof the plaintiff
will apply to the court for the relief
demanded in the complaint, to wit:
For a judgment against the said de-
fendant, Frank Irish, for the sum of
\$500, together with interest thereon
at the rate of 10 per cent per annum
from January 8, 1912, and for the
further sum of \$57.08 paid out for
taxes on said premises, with interest
thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per
annum from December 13, 1913, and
for the further sum of \$100 at attor-
ney's fees for instituting this suit, and
for the costs and disbursements here-
in; that the said sum of \$57.08, with
interest thereon at the rate of 10 per
cent per annum from December 13,
1913, be declared to be an additional
lien on said premises in favor of
plaintiff and against defendant; that
the usual decree be made for the sale
of the lands and premises described
in plaintiff's mortgage; that is to say:

West half of northwest quarter of
section thirty-five, and the east half
of the southeast quarter of section
nineteen, and the east half of the
northeast quarter of section thirty,
all in township thirty-eight south,
range ten east of Willamette meridi-
an, in Oregon.

That the said sale be made by the
sheriff of Klamath county, Oregon, in
manner provided by law. That the
proceeds of said sale be applied in the
payment of said judgment, interest,
costs and attorney's fees and all ac-
cruing costs. That plaintiff have ex-
ecution against the defendant for any
balance that may remain due the
plaintiff after applying all the proceeds
of said sale as above provided. That
the defendant and all persons claim-
ing under him subsequent to the exe-
cution of plaintiff's said mortgage

MORAL WAVELET HITS ST. LOUIS

"GRADUAL ELIMINATION" PLAN
OF THE CITY OFFICIALS IS BE-
GINNING TO CLEAR OUT THE
UNDESIRABLES

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 28.—All vice
houses in St. Louis were to be closed
tonight at midnight, according to the
"gradual elimination plan" of the
board of police commissioners, who
started the movement to clear out the
tenderloin early in the year.

About 325 inmates were expected to
be driven from the houses tonight.
The St. Louis police began with
clamping down the lid tight on the
selling of liquor in the tenderloin.
Next came a schedule of "early closing,"
and forbidding music in the
houses.

The last big movement of the
"gradual plan" was the forcing of the
telephone companies to remove all
telephones. The women have, in the
majority of cases, gone to Chicago
and other large cities.
