Peter in the stocks in prison, liberated, sending out his messages of life. Faced right. Paul, stoned, whipped, but with men eagerly reading his messages, though nineteen hundred years have gone. Faced right. James killed with the sword for his faith, and John shouting his revelation of the Son of God past Patmos' waves and against the waves

of sin even now. Faced right. Any man any where, bowing with his sin laden heart before his God, meek and repentant, bruised and broken, defeated, sorry, facing about and up. Faced right.
