Movies on Sunday

The Sunday movie ordinance was defeated by the city council last night by a tie vote. Cameron, Blount and Johnson voting for it and Pfeiffer, Simpson and McElmurry voting against it. The anti-card playing ordinance went through by a vote of 5 to 1 without an emergency clause, while the ordinance providing penalties for insulting people in public or private places, swearing over the telephone or destroying public or private property was passed. Medford Man Invents

E. W. Liljgram, the well known Medford mining engineer and metallurgist, has just received a patent on an automatic dam cresting device. It is designed to conserve water at low stage, and permit high floods passing over without any attendant. The device is constructed to serve the same purpose to a dam that a safety valve is to a steam boiler, an automatic release of power at the damage point.—Medford Mail-Tribune.

A good roads meeting was held in Weed Thursday p. m., at which a delegation from Dorris, Sisson and Weed discussed ways and means to survey a good county road from Dorris to Weed to give Butte Valley a much needed outlet to the state highway.—Weed Lookout.

Work on Highway Soon

J. W. Sweeney, the contractor on the Pacific highway, states that his first camp is well under way and he hopes to be in shape to put on men in about a week. The first camp is at Stinemman. He will later put in one at Siskiyou and also one near Coles or Colestin, where the heavy rock-work is on the other side of the divide.—Ashland Tidings.

Ashland Wants Normal

Will Ashland back up the normal school campaign? The reports point that way. The two committees appointed for Bellevue have only received one turnout and hand running signed up thirty memberships right off the bat. That makes \$300 on the face of it without counting the moral influence that this spirit will contribute to organized work.—Ashland Tidings.

Good Year Expected

The large supply of water the miners are receiving from the hills on Greenhorn guarantee a specially good year. On account of the open winter the miners commenced a month earlier and the quantity of snow in the mountains will enable them to hydraulick later than the average summer generally allows.—Yreka Journal.

Federal Building Soon

Construction work on the handsome federal building for the Dalles will be commenced this summer, and the structure will face Second street, announced Representative Sinnott in a communication which was received today by Postmaster Williams.—The Dalles Chronicle.

The Meier & Frank stores at Portland are to be raised to twelve stories for the entire block which they occupy at a cost of \$1,250,000.

A committee of citizens of Drain in northern Douglas county has inspected the Eugene cannery and will proceed to act at Drain.

F. M. Fletcher has been on Coos Bay prospecting for the location of a Beaver Compo Board plant—a line of building material.

There is a general movement among sawmill men to resist encroachments of labor organizations and conduct their industries on open shop lines.

The \$600,000 public auditorium for Portland has at last been located on Market block.

Guy L. Anderson, general manager of the Sumpter valley railroad, announces expenditures of \$100,000 on betterments of that line.

Toledo Lumber company shipped 450 carloads during 1913, and the city is to have an electric light and power station built at once.

Ashland prospectors have found a lithia water spring that has a flow of twenty-five gallons per minute and will bottle the product.

A modern vulcanizing plant will be installed at Salem April 1st.

After long delays, the Southern Pacific company bridge across Coos Bay is at last agreed upon—to be of the swing-draw type.

The fight to make the state printing office an open shop has been renewed by the Employers Association of Portland.

A cheese factory is to be located at Half Way station in the Pine valley by the Jensen Creamery company of Baker City.

The people of Orenco have voted to issue bonds for a municipal water plant.

The St. Helens incubator company has a large order for incubators and brooders from an Eastern mail order house.

Business men of Eugene are planning to have a county manufacturers' exhibit and factories' promotion conference in April.

Mrs. Kicker—"What could they do about it?"

Mrs. Wise—"Wait a minute. Let's see what the law is. (Coda book.) Here it is:

"Section 1992, Lord's Oregon Laws: "Any person who wilfully or maliciously, with intent to injure or defraud:

"1.—Connects a tube, pipe, wire or other instrument or contrivance, with a pipe or wire used for the conducting or supplying of illuminating gas of fuel or electricity in such a manner as to supply gas or electricity to any burner, orifice, lamp or motor where the same is or can be burned or used, without passing through the meter or instrument provided for registering the quantity consumed, or

"4.—Makes any connection or reconnection with the gas mains, service pipes or wires of any person, company or corporation furnishing to consumers gas or electricity, or turns on or off or in any manner interferes with any valve or stopcock or other appliance belonging to such person, company or corporation, and connected with its service or other pipes or wires, or uses electricity for any purpose, without first producing from such person, company or corporation a written permit to turn on or off such stopcock or valve, or to make such connections or reconnections, or to interfere with the valves, stopcocks, wires or other appliances of such person, company or corporation, as the case may be: shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than six months nor more than two years, or by fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, or by both such fine and imprisonment."
