Madera's Death a Boomerang

As Result, Huerta's Regime Has Been Ill-Starred

Bloody Dictator Laughed at President Wilson's Refusal of Recognition, But Now Knows It Means His Death Knell

Written for the United Press by an American in Mexico

This is the second of a series of four articles telling the real facts which have led up to present conditions in Mexico, written by an American who has spent several years at Mexico City.

VERA CRUZ, March 6.—Following the ruthless killing of Gustavo and Francisco Madero and Vice-President Suarez, General Huerta issued an "explanation" of the deaths of the latter two.

"It was all due to their trying to escape," said Huerta's representative. "They were placed in an automobile to be taken to another jail. A band of men rode up to rescue them, and, in the fight, both Madero and Suarez were killed. It is very regrettable and we wish you would quote us in your despatches as saying that it is very terrible and sad."

Huerta made no effort to "explain" why, in the "exchange of bullets," which had killed Madero and Suarez, and riddled the closed automobile in which they were claimed to have been riding, not one person besides Madero and Suarez had been hit. It was not explained how the so-called "band of rescuers" had shot down the men they were "trying to rescue," without wounding one of the guards who surrounded Madero and Suarez.

Civilization was jolted by the astonishing news. Huerta, from the chair in which the murdered had sat, explained that he had had nothing to do with the killing. He would act as president until a fair election could be held. He felt he was able to keep peace in the country. The army, he said, was with him, and it had never been with Madero at heart.

Two matters of tremendous importance to Huerta occurred almost immediately. The hardy Venustiano Carranza, one of Madero's closest friends, governor of a northern state, student of socialism and democracy, declared that he would fight the new government. And the United States government refused to recognize the government founded by Huerta.

Huerta had overreached himself in permitting the slaying of Francisco Madero. The killing of Gustavo Madero would probably have been condoned by the Mexican people, for, though they liked Madero the president, they hated Gustavo for his lack of conscience and felt that it was Gustavo who was making Francisco's administration a failure, through graft and cruelty.

But the slaying of the little president, the gentle man who would not kill Diaz when Diaz was in his power, and who would not take the life of Reyes, when Reyes had tried to take his, who almost faithfully followed the biblical admonition to turn the other cheek, and who was true to his big dream that human rights stand above all other rights, was an affront to all human progress. The man who slew such a leader tried to overthrow the hopes of common humanity.

It is not to be wondered at that the United States government refused to recognize Huerta as provisional president. England, however, hurriedly recognized the presidency of Huerta, but there is small wonder for this because Huerta was friendly to the English oil interests of Mexico, and Lord Cowdray, head of these interests, was a leader of the ruling party in England. Other nations followed England's lead. Woodrow Wilson took office as president of the United States. He declared that Huerta must not hold office as president of Mexico; that a presidency "gained by bloodshed and treachery could not be upheld in any country in America." This seemed like sheer talk, for the time.

Huerta didn't get out; his government continued in power. But the passage of a few weeks showed the force of Wilson's declarations. Huerta sent commissioners to Europe to sell an issue of \$200,000,000 (silver)

in bonds. But the European bankers said, "We cannot take these bonds until the United States recognizes as legal the government established by Huerta."

The efforts of Huerta to gain funds became more and more desperate. Leaders of the people arose against him. The French revolution has nothing more grim and terrible to show than the incidents of the days that followed. One senator made his will at his home and marched down to the senate chamber. He arose and said, in substance:

"These are my last words, my will and testament to the Mexican people, whom I love. I believe I shall perish for what I am going to say, but here and now I declare that Victoriano Huerta is a tyrant who must be over-

thrown." That night he disappeared and has never been seen again. Where his grave is, is not even known to his family.

Another member of the house of deputies, a young Mexican who was a graduate of Cornell College, in the United States, was outspoken against Huerta. One evening, dining at the home of American friends, near his own house, he said at the table: "I am against Huerta and have declared myself. No one speaks publicly of all of Huerta's enemies who have been disappearing so mysteriously of late, but I will join the missing some fine day."

He bade goodnight to his host at 11 o'clock to walk the three blocks to his home, and he also has never been seen.

Mrs. Wise—"But you know you are liable to a severe penalty for using appliances without the knowledge of the company."

Mrs. Kicker—"What could they do about it?"

Mrs. Wise—"Wait a minute. Let's see what the law is. (Ceta book.) Here it is:

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"1.—Connects a tube, pipe, wire or other instrument or contrivance, with a pipe or wire used for the conducting or supplying of illuminating gas of fuel or electricity in such a manner as to supply gas or electricity to any burner, orifice, lamp or motor where the same is or can be burned or used, without passing through the meter or instrument provided for registering the quantity consumed, or

"4.—Makes any connection or reconnection with the gas mains, service pipes or wires of any person, company or corporation furnishing to consumers gas or electricity, or turns on or off or in any manner interferes with any valve or stopcock of other appliance belonging to such person, company or corporation, and connected with its service or other pipes or wires, or uses electricity for any purpose, without first producing from such person, company or corporation a written permit to turn on or off such stopcock or valve, or to make such connections or reconnections, or to interfere with the valves, stopcocks, wires or other appliances of such person, company or corporation, as the case may be: shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than six months nor more than two years, or by fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, or by both such fine and imprisonment."
