

HOBO ARMIES ARE MADE TO MOVE ON

TWO HUNDRED REFUGEE SUR-ROUND CAMPS AT DAYBREAK, AND UNEMPLOYED LEAVE IN BOX CARS

OAKLAND, March 6.—When the Thorne and Kelley armies of unemployed awoke this morning they were surrounded by 200 police officers, armed with rifles, and ordered to leave. The Thorne, or I. W. W. faction, yielded, and were herded aboard box cars and started to Contra Costa county.
Kelley, though, said he would die first, but he finally weakened, and ordered his men to take box cars for Richmond. He remained with the army's baggage, the police allowing him time to pack up.

ALASKA LEASING BILL COMES OUT

ADMINISTRATION MEASURE PROVIDES FOR LEASES ON FORTY-ACRE BLOCKS, UNDER THE ROYALTY SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 6.—Congressman Scott Ferriss of Oklahoma today introduced the administration bill for the lease of Alaskan coal lands.
This measure provides for the leasing of blocks of forty acres or multiples, up to 2,400 acres. It fixes a two-cent a ton minimum royalty system, together with an annual rental for the lands.

STATE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT AT WORK TO PROSECUTE FURNISHING CANNED ORATIONS, ET CETERA

SALEM, March 6.—In an endeavor to stop the flow of circular letters into Oregon from alleged Eastern "Lecture bureaus," which offer to supply students expecting to graduate from high schools or colleges this spring, with orations or essays on any possible subject, State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill today is on the trail of the "canned oration" producers, with threats to prosecute under the law regulating correspondence schools.
Not only do the bureaus offer to furnish students with anything from a "valedictory" to a "class prophecy," but they offer to furnish "very cleverly written presentation addresses" for the chairman of the school board.

The following, which appeared in the Detroit Tribune, is reprinted for the perusal of the many Klamath friends of the writer:

Editor Detroit Tribune.—Your editorial of today, "Let Us Know," has put into few words what many of would fain—but are unable to—express in many words, namely, that people are awakening to the fact that whether men who do not work are rich or poor, they are taken care of by the men who do work.

Quod erat demonstrandum. But is your remedy equal in brevity and value to your diagnosis?
You say, "Why not let the idle poor do a part of the world's work, even if we have to lay off for a little while each week to let them get a chance at exercising their muscles?"
The inference is that some men are working excessively because other men (the idle rich and the idle poor) are not working at all and that the workers are supporting the idlers who are idle because there is not enough work to go round. If that is not so, where is the necessity of "some of us laying off each week to give the others a chance, etc.?"

Are all possible jobs pre-empted? Has population exceeded the limits of subsistence? Surely not, when only 27 percent of tillable land in the United States is under cultivation, the rest being held mostly out of use by speculators.

Every idle man—rich or poor—is passing on the burden of his support to some other man, the rich because they want to and the poor through necessity.

Be It resolved by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, that D. B. Campbell, Marion Hanks and C. H. Crisler, being three disinterested freeholders of the City of Klamath Falls, possessing the qualifications of Jurors of the Circuit Court of Klamath County, are hereby appointed viewers, to view the extension and change of Second Street, to be known as Second Street boulevard, and to make assessment of damages and benefits as provided in Sec. 234 of the Charter of the City.
