said, to measure and see if one was receiving the amount bought.

For this purpose he advised the farmers to send to the Oregon Agricultural College for small weir tables, which are appliances for measuring all water passing through the weir.

The duty and service of water, said the speaker, depends on soils and crops, and is also affected by fertility of soil and weather conditions and method of planting.

The application of water to land is

modified by kind and amount of cultivation, and method of purchase, and is closely related to the time, amount and frequency of irrigation.

The proper amount per each irrigation depends on the water capacity of the soil, depth of root zone, capillary power of soil below root zone and dryness of soil at time of irrigation. He said the frequency of irrigation depends on rate of lost moisture from the soil, and the amount of wetness the crop would tolerate. The time for irrigation, said the speaker, would have to be judged by the appearance of crops, weather conditions, escape of moisture by evaporation, etc.

scription, stating whether grade, pure-bred or registered. If grade only, the amount of Percheron blood should be stated.

Where a bidder offers more than one stallion, he may, in a separate communication, submit a bid for delivery at the school of all such stallions on the basis of one shipment.

The cattle to be purchased for the Klamath reservation consist of fifty bulls and 686 heifers. These bids will be opened at the office of the bureau of Indian affairs in Washington, D. C., on April 24.

The specifications given by the government, follow:

Animals must be satisfactory in type, color and conformation, and free from physical defects and deformities that will injure their value for breeding purposes, or for the market.

Heifers should average normal size and individuals conspicuously undersized will be rejected. They must be two years old, full age July 1, 1914, range raised; none to show traces of recognized dairy breeds. They must be either native bred and raised, not less than three-fourths Hereford blood; native bred and raised, not less than one-half Hereford blood; Mexican bred and raised, not less than three-fourths Hereford blood; Mexican bred and raised, not less than one-half Hereford blood.

Bulls must not be below normal breeding size, nor so lacking in type or conformation as to render them unsuitable for breeding purposes. They must be native grown and preference will be given to those grown in climates and altitudes similar to where they are to be used. They must be either pure bred Hereford two years old; not less than seven-eighths Hereford blood, two years old; pure bred Hereford, one year old; not less than seven-eighths Hereford blood, one year old.

Preference will be given the first

named of each class, but bids on the others will be considered, providing the difference in prices justify. In either case they should be full age July 1, 1914. Bids should state clearly what class is offered.

Certificates from the breeders as to breeding, place where bred, and where raised must accompany cattle when presented for inspection.

Rules and regulations of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, and state laws with respect to contagious and infectious diseases must be complied with, and documentary evidence to that effect satisfactory to representatives of the bureau of animal industry must accompany the cattle when presented for inspection.

Delivery must be made between June 1st and June 30, 1914.
