Nearly one hundred members of the local Elks Lodge were present Thursday evening to participate in the annual election of officers. OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Better Way"

By R. J. S. Stubbfield, Pastor First Presbyterian Church

"Show I unto you a more excellent way." I Corinthians, 12:31.

Paul says that he will show the people of Corinth a more excellent way to live. He assumes that when he shows them something better than that which they have they will want it and seek it. This is true in every realm of life. The house plant that is set between a window and a dark corner grows toward the window, because the air in that direction is better. A sheep will go from one hillside to another when the grass on the other hillside looks better. Men traveling between two points will generally travel the best road, if they know which road is best. If you show a person something better than that which he has, it is natural for him to want it. If you show a farmer a better plow, he wants it. If you show a printer a better printing press, he wants it. If you show a housewife a better iron, she wants it. If you can truly show a man a better way of life, he wants it. One purpose for which Jesus came was to actually show people the better way to live. The word "show" as we are using it here, and as Paul uses it in the text, means to prove or to demonstrate. Paul believed in showing rather than asserting. In demonstrating rather than declaring. Paul seems to have thought that the best way to convince a person was to show him. Paul never heard of Missouri or of a Missourian, but he knew how to deal with Missourians. The people of this generation in our land and in all parts of the world have the Missourian characteristic of desiring to be shown. The word of a person who is an authority on a subject does not go very far. The people of this age say, "I should rather you would show me." The ladies who attended the "short course" at the high school during the past week manifested more interest in that which was demonstrated than in that which was declared, even though that which was declared was with authority. Today in politics the principles of a political party count for less and its word for more than at any time in the past. It is very evidently then the duty of those of

us who count ourselves Christians to prove to the world that the Christian way is the more excellent way.

It does not follow that everyone who is shown the more excellent way will accept it. Not every farmer who is shown a better plow will buy it. He naturally wants it, if he is convinced that it is better, but he may not be willing to pay the price. The Oriental may see that the Christian way is the more excellent way, but he is not willing to give up the way in which his fathers trod for the new way. There are people in Klamath Falls today whose Godly mothers have shown that the way Paul speaks of is the more excellent way, but there are certain things which they are not willing to give up for it. It is the duty of every Christian to show, to prove, to demonstrate that the way of the Christ is the more excellent way.

Mrs. Wise—"But you know you are liable to a severe penalty for using appliances without the knowledge of the company."

Mrs. Kicker—"What could they do about it?"

Mrs. Wise—"Wait a minute. Let's see what the law is. (Gets book.) Here it is:

"Section 1992, Lord's Oregon Laws:

"Any person who wilfully or maliciously, with intent to injure or defraud:

"1.—Connects a tube, pipe, wire or other instrument or contrivance, with a pipe or wire used for the conducting or supplying of illuminating gas or electricity in such a manner as to supply gas or electricity to any burner, orifice, lamp or motor where the same is or can be burned or used, without passing through the meter or instrument provided for registering the quantity consumed, or . . .

"4.—Makes any connection or reconnection with the gas mains, service pipes or wires of any person, company or corporation furnishing to consumers gas or electricity, or turns on or off in any manner interferes with any valve or stopcock or other appliance belonging to such person, company or corporation, and connected with its service or other pipes or wires, or uses electricity for any purpose, without first producing from such person, company or corporation a written permit to turn on or off such stopcock or valve, or to make such connections or reconnections, or to interfere with the valves, stopcocks, wires or other appliances of such person, company or corporation, as the case may be: . . . shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than six months nor more than two years, or by fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, or by both such fine and imprisonment."
