### MURRAY TO RUN FOR MAYORALTY

streets I am in favor of letting the men who pay the bills decide on the character of pavement that shall be laid, and when that is done, then in securing for them the highest quality of work possible. I will see that one hundred cents in value is returned for every dollar spent, not only in pavement, but in every other department of the city government. I favor the rigid enforcement of contract and specifications, and will personally see that this is done in every contract that the city may have.

In all public work I am in favor of the employment of home labor. I believe that every man who is now here is the one entitled to first consideration, and if elected I favor the establishment of a city register, where such men as desire work shall place their names, so that they shall be in line for employment by the contractors doing the public work.

I am in favor of the construction of the Second street boulevard, as well as a driveway entirely around Lake Ewauna, connecting with one to the Upper Lake, and such other improvements as will enhance the beauty of this scenic gem. Lake Ewauna has too long been neglected, and I will do all that I can to bring about the completion of this boulevard and these improvements during my administration.

I am in favor of connecting the outlying sections of the city with roads and sidewalks that can be used during all seasons of the year, and will start work on such improvements immediately following my taking of office, should I be elected. I do not want the people to think that my position on these questions are campaign promises. I consider them solemn pledges, and I will carry them out or retire from the office of mayor. Under my administration this city shall forge ahead in a reasonable, rational way—free from frenzied finance and fake promotion schemes; it shall be a progressive city, or I will turn the office of mayor over to some one else.

**Municipal Ownership**

This is another infant of campaign birth—brought forth just before elections, to be placed asleep again immediately following the closing of the ballot boxes. I am in favor of the city acquiring its own water works—the present one, if equitable terms can be reached with the present owners; a new one if a fair price cannot be agreed upon. This can be done without adding one cent to the burden of taxation or increasing the cost of water to the consumer. I believe that water rates can be lowered. I favor charter amendments that will make it impossible for future administrations to increase water rates or exceed the income of the water department without a vote of the people, thus providing a check for recklessness in the conduct of such a water department.

I am most heartily in favor of the entrance of the Kern Brothers' power line; not, however, under the terms of a franchise, but under those of a permit to use the streets of the city. They should be admitted on the same terms as those now enjoyed by the present company. If they are in good faith, this will be sufficient; if they are not in good faith, then we do not want them. I am opposed to granting them a franchise that they may use for barter and sale, and one that the city may have to buy back at the not far distant future. But a short time remains until Klamath Falls will be operating its own power and light plant, and when that question comes up, we do not want a franchise to arise as a barrier to the consummation of such a program.

**Prohibition and Saloons**

I am in favor of the strict enforcement of the law. If this city shall remain "wet," then the saloons shall run under the provisions of the law, honestly and impartially administered. If it should be voted "dry," then it will be "dry" in every sense of the word. I will assume the personal responsibility of seeing that the local option law is not violated, and I will not hide behind my chief of police, or any other official, on this question. If there are violations sufficient to attract the attention of even a very small number of citizens, then there shall be violation enough to attract the attention of any official, and I may be considered false to my pledges should I fail to detect such violations and force the offenders to suffer the penalty of the law.

**Police Department**

I do not believe that there is any necessity for a police force as large as that now maintained, and if elected I will reduce it to not more than three, or even less, if conditions warrant it. The money now being wasted in this manner might be better spent in the construction of crosswalks or other street improvements. If elected I will make a clean sweep of this department, and will appoint only such men as will meet the qualifications of efficient officers.

**Fire Department**

I believe that the recommendation of the members of the fire department should be recognized in the appointment of the fire chief. These men give their time without money and without price at all hours of the day or night in the protection of life and property against fire, and I believe that they should have substantial recognition from the city government. Adequate quarters should be furnished by the city, and a comfortable and well equipped reading room provided in the city hall. Gratitude for what they have done and for what they stand ready to do demands this modicum of recognition, and should I be elected, I shall do everything I can to see that it is granted.

**System**

I believe that a more business-like system for the expenditure of the moneys of the city should be established, and if elected the first duty I shall undertake is the inauguration of a plan of requisitions that will secure for the city full value for the money spent as a check against reckless extravagance and irresponsible buying. In conclusion, I wish to add that I invite through the columns of the newspapers of the city communications on any questions that may arise in the mind of the voters. The newspapers will be glad to give publicity, free of charge, to such letters, as well as my replies, and thus furnish an opportunity for an open discussion before all of the people.

Notice Inviting Proposals to Purchase City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until Monday, April 13, 1914, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the city hall in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon (at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered), for the purchase of \$17,388.70 City of Klamath Falls, coupon improvement bonds, payable ten

years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the office of the treasurer of said city or at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in New York, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of America. Said bonds will be issued in denominations not exceeding \$500 each, and numbered from one to 35, inclusive.

Said bonds are issued under ordinance No. 319 of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Said bonds are issued for the purpose of providing funds to pay a portion of the cost of improving Sixth street from the westerly line of Kinlock avenue to the easterly city limits, including intersections.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder for cash, and for not less than par value and accrued interest. Each proposal to purchase said

bonds must be accompanied by a check for five per cent of the amount of the proposal, and certified by some responsible bank, payable to the order of the undersigned. Proposals must be sealed and endorsed, "Proposal to Purchase Improvement Bonds."

The common council of said city reserves the right to reject and annul bids and proposals to purchase said bonds.

Said bonds will contain a provision to the effect that the city reserves the right to take up and cancel said bonds, upon payment at any time of the face value thereof with accrued interest to date of payment, at 60% semi-annual coupon period, at or after one year from the date of such bond or bonds.
