Campaign for Dry Oregon Is
Launched by the Prohibitionists

NATIONAL ORGANIZATION COMES
TO THE CAUSE OF THE STATE
LEAGUE AND WILL SEND MANY
SPEAKERS OF NOTE

(Herald Special Service)

WESTERVILLE, Ohio, March 16.
The Anti-Saloon League of Amer-
ica, whose headquarters and general
publishing house is in this city, has
determined to throw the whole power
of its organization to the assistance of
the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon and
the other organizations co-operating
with it for a dry Oregon this year.

At the recent national convention
of the league held at Columbus, Ohio,
that body was completely reorganized.
Prior to that the national body was a
loose federation of state leagues, with
out much control over local organiza-
tions.

The reorganized body is a compact
machine, in which all of the state
organizations have become depart-
ments of the national organization.
This reorganization becomes effective
on June 1. The country is divided
into sixteen districts, at the head of
each of which is a representative and
member of the national board of trust-
ees. The member of the national
board for the far Northwest is Hon.
Fletcher Homan of Salem, Oregon.

The heads of the Oregon state de-
partment of the league are Rev. J. H.
Bennett president, and Hon. H. L.
Sheldon superintendent. The offices
of the state are located in the Stock
Exchange building, Portland, Ore.

The second week in April, the ad-
vance guard of the national spell-
binders will enter the state and con-
duct the preliminary series of rallies.

William C. Ellis Faints When
Convicted of Murder of His Wife

William C. Ellis, the Cincinnati
man, who has just been convicted of
murdering his wife in a Chicago ho-
tel last October, was placed under
such a strain during the cross-exami-
nation by the prosecutor that he
fainted in the witness chair. Before
a crowded court room, in which there
were many well dressed women, he
showed signs of nervousness, and
finally fell forward till he was caught
by those nearest him.
Ellis claimed that he had been
driven to mania by the knowledge
that his wife had given her love to
Fred G. Cauldwell of Brantford, Ont.,
a young drygoods merchant. He fol-

lowed his wife several days after she
went to Chicago on a visit to relatives.
They celebrated the ninth anniversary
of their wedding with a dinner and
theater party the night of the murder.
Ellis appeared dazed. He has slight-
ly slashed his own wrists and throat.
He at first declared the tragedy was
the result of a suicide agreement be-
cause of his business troubles. Be-
fore the coroner's jury he changed
his explanation. He testified that he
alone was responsible for the killing,
but that he had meant that both
should die. He was sentenced to fif-
teen years' imprisonment.

merly supported it.
Ex-Governor Robert B. Glenn of

on the prohibition ticket, will be an-
other of the "big guns" that will take
part in the Oregon fight.

Beef and Pork Held
Firm All the Week

(Herald Special Service)
PORTLAND, March 16.—Beef
liquidation showed a material de-
cline last week. The run contained
few really smooth fat steers, but the
to 15c higher was bid for the same
class the week before.

Butcher stock was firmer in all de-
partments. Best light steers were
steady at from \$7.50 to \$7.65; cows,
\$6.50 to \$6.65, and bulls \$5.75 to \$6.

The hog market also looked better
after the bearish close of the week

before. Gains were not on the na-
tional order, but decidedly steady.
The extreme top for prime light
swine was \$8.70, while the bulk of
sales averaged \$8.50 to \$8.65, with
receipts of a fair volume.

Not much life in the sheep for the
week, due to lack of supply. Some
medium grade ewes were received,
and the sale of four or five ears of
fancy wethers at 16 featured.

Lambs were scarce and in demand,
while mutton and lamb prices were
steady to strong.
