Deadly Typhoid Fly an Old Acquaintance in Disguise—Department of Agriculture Investigates Certain Disease-Bearing Insects, Including Stable Fly and the Spotted Fever Tick.

The typhoid fly is merely an old acquaintance in disguise. The department of agriculture's scientists have decided that this is the most appropriate name for the insect commonly known as the "house fly," which is a most dangerous creature, although considered at most simply a nuisance by many people.

This fly is one of the most active agents in spreading typhoid fever. It spreads Asiatic cholera and other diseases of the intestines. It has been known to be a factor in spreading tuberculosis.

If the name of the typhoid fly could be popularized, perhaps a more general idea could be given of the danger that lurks wherever the pest is present.

Another name which has been suggested for this pest is even better than the ordinary term "house fly." This is "manure fly." The insect is quite as partial to manure as it is to the house. Its chief breeding place is the manure heap.

In eradicating the breeding place of this pest, however, the department is seeking a method that will accomplish the work without lessening the value of the fertilizer. Satisfactory progress has been made and announcements concerning the new methods probably will be issued soon.

The fly season begins in the South during the last part of February, and the department's investigator of malarial mosquitoes there is also considering methods for controlling the typhoid fly.

The department is also investigating the stable fly, which is an important enemy to agriculture in that it seriously reduces the value of live-

stock. It is also suspected of carrying infantile paralysis.

In Montana the department is conducting another investigation of a disease bearing insect.

This is the carrier of "spotted fever"—a species of tick in the Northern Rocky Mountain region.

Still another investigation has to do with the possibility that pellagra is transmitted by insects. This has not yet been proven.

The department of agriculture's bureau of entomology has a bulletin for distribution dealing with the typhoid fly. Remedies and preventives are recommended.

An "Average French Family" United Press Service
PARIS, March 17.—Commenting on the declining birth rate in France, a writer in the *Matin* declares that the average French family now consists of a dog, a piano and a child.

"Monsieur plays with the dog, Madame plays the piano, and the child is left to either the grandmother, the aunt or the servant," says the writer, who contends that with only sons marrying only daughters, the enormous proportion of one-child families will be considerably increased during the next generation.

SACRAMENTO, March 17.—Statistics here today showed the value of the viti-cultural product in California during 1913 reached the total of \$26,875,000. Grapes were sold to wineries for \$15,000,000; table grapes brought in \$7,000,000, and the value of the raisin crop was \$4,875,000.

A large sand and gravel plant is being installed at Shady Point, near Sutherlin, with a spur from the Southern Pacific.

Albany city council has adopted resolutions looking to acquiring a municipal light and power plant for that city.

J. M. Eddy and associates have organized a company to operate a basalt rock quarry on Kentuck Inlet, North Bend.

The Oregon Power company will spend \$10,000 on a new fuel plant at Eugene.

All industries will be relieved in Oregon by the decision of Judge McGinn, allowing semi-annual payment of Taxes.

Twohy Bros. of Portland will employ 400 men building the Echo-Coyote cutoff of twenty miles on the O. W. R. & N., to cost \$800,000.

Oscar E. Heints has contracted to build a five story block for the Blake-

McFall Paper company of Portland, 100x200 feet.

The edve large shingle and lumber plants at Raymond have decided that the 1,500 men employed by them shall work under open shop rules.

Clackamas county will build a steel bridge at Barton over the Clackamas River and install a rock crusher at Sandy.

Guthrie, McDougal & Co. of Portland have the contract for constructing a large section of the Puget Sound and Willapa Harbor railway.

T. J. Scammon of Goldendale is starting a large private fish hatchery plant in the Ten Mile region near Coos Bay.

A new cannery to cost \$10,000 and a new high school are planned for this spring at Springfield.
