Says Judges Archaic;
Recommends Training

United Press Service

NORFOLK, La., March 16.—Many
judges and officials for enforcing
laws of the land are archaic and
should be trained to the newer
thought in legislation, according to
Mornay Williams, chairman of the
New York Child Labor committee,
who addressed the Tenth National
conference.

The speaker was discussing the diffi-
culty experienced in having properly
enforced or favored legitimately in
court decisions some of the new pro-
gressive laws, especially those re-
lating to child labor.

"It is not that the courts or the
enforcing officials are corrupt (al-
though that occasionally occurs) but
that they are out of harmony with
the movement which has produced
the law, and the remedy must be
sought in training judges and en-

forcing officials, not in attacking our
system of law, and the integrity of
the courts."

It is comparatively easy, declared
the New Yorker, to secure legisla-
tion under stress of strong public
feeling either of sympathy or indigna-
tion, but it is sometimes most diffi-
cult to secure enforcement. "There
are always two sides to be con-
sidered," said Williams, "in the case
of any legal reform—enactment of
reformatory legislation and its en-
forcement."

"Unless legislation is of such a
character to commend itself generally
to officials, it is difficult to secure its
enforcement, if it runs contrary to
old usages and vested interests. This
is the chief explanation of the diffi-
culty of enforcing adequate child labor
laws."
