National Press Club
Opens Its New Home

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The
National Press club threw open its
doors to the public today. Tonight
President Wilson and other notables
will be its guests at a house-warming.
This club, comprising in its member-
ship local newspapermen, leading
Washington newspaper correspond-
ents, and a notable roll of men in
high official life, has outgrown its
quarters for the second time and to-
night's housewarming finds it in
much larger and more elaborate quar-
ters than before.
The National Press club is a sort
of democratic cleaning house for news
and social intercourse. Here the cor-
respondents of the "Cross Roads
Clarion" can exchange views—and
news—with the correspondent of the
more or less pretentious "New York
Nuggett." Here he can meet the big-
gest men in the newspaper profession
in Washington, and the highest of-
ficials. Presidents, senators, con-
gressmen, have been the club's
guests. Prominent scientists, politi-
cians, explorers and musicians have
assisted in its "hobby night" enter-
tainment. In these affairs the man
who might seem high and mighty and
far away from the common people
drops off the cares of state and busi-
ness, and jokes and laughs, and, in
short, shows that he's a regular fel-
low.
Already, as at its other quarters,
the club has thrown away its front
door key. It is always open, and
there is generally a group of mem-
bers there at every hour of the day
or night. For the night workers, it
is the only place for respite or amuse-

ment that Washington affords in the
week's hours.
So every morning when the news-
paper presses throughout the nation
are grinding out the press members'
contributions, there is a gathering of
correspondents in the big living room
for music, song, story and feasting.
Its members carry more big secrets
every day than any similar size group
of men. It's watchword is "the pen
is mightier than the sword."

and adopted by the common council
of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon,
on the 16th day of March, 1914, notice

received by the police judge of said
city at his office, corner Second and
Main streets, up to and including the
30th day of March, 1914, at the hour
of 3 o'clock p. m., for the improve-
ment of Eighth street from Main to
High; High street from Eighth to
Ninth; Ninth street from High to
Prospect; Prospect street from Ninth
to Upham; Upham street from Pros-
pect to White; White street from Up-
ham to Delta.

By grading said streets and parts
thereof to the established grade to a
width of twenty-five feet, and sur-
faced for a width of twenty-five feet
in the center with oil macadam pave-
ment, between the termini named, in-
cluding all intersections. All of said
improvement to be made, and the ma-
terials to be used to be in accord-
ance with the plans and specifica-
tions made by the city engineer and
now on file in the office of the Police
Judge of said city, reference thereto
is hereby made for further details re-
garding construction, materials and
quantities.
Said improvement will be let in one
contract, and bids for making such
improvement will be opened and con-
sidered by the common council on the
30th day of March, 1914, immediately
after the hour of 3 o'clock p. m. of
said day or at such other time as the
council may adjourn the meeting to
for further consideration of bids.
Bidders will be required to sub-
mit their bids or proposals upon
blanks prepared by the city engineer,
and no bids will be considered unless
so submitted.
Blanks may be obtained either at
the office of the Police Judge or at
the office of the City Engineer.
Said improvement to be completed
on or before the . . . day of . . .
191. The successful bidder will
be required to give a bond in the sum of
\$. to be fixed by the council,
for the faithful performance and com-
pletion of such improvement. Each
bid must be accompanied by a certi-
fied check on a responsible bank for 5
per cent of the amount of the bid, as
a guarantee that the successful bid-
der will enter into bond and contract
with the city within ten days from the
date of the award, for the faithful
performance of such improvement in
accordance with the plans and specifi-
cations.

Resolution approving the plans and
Specifications prepared by the
City Engineer for the improve-
ment of Third Street, in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon, deter-
mining the boundaries within
which the Property lies which is
to be benefited and to be Assess-
ed for such improvement, and
Ordering the Publication of this
Said Resolution and the Posting
of Notices by the City Engineer.
Whereas, The common council of
the City of Klamath Falls did hereto-
fore declare its intention to improve

Third street in the said city from the
intersection of Main street to the in-
tersection of California street, and
did order the City Engineer to pre-
pare plans and specifications for such
improvement;

And, Whereas, The said City En-
gineer has filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varia-
tions of the kind of improvement pro-
posed for said street, and the same
now being found satisfactory, they
are hereby approved, and it is decided
and determined, and the common
council hereby determines to improve
said street within said limits by grad-
ing to the established grade to a
width of 24 feet, from Main street to
California avenue, and hard surfacing
said roadway 24 feet wide from Main
street to Grant street with 6 inches of
crushed rock, with an asphalt binder,
and surface valley gutters and with-
out curbing, and also providing neces-
sary drainage.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the City Engineer cover-
ing such work are to be used as a
basis for such work, and any contract
for such improvement shall be based
thereon, and the estimated cost of
such work and improvement as sub-
mitted by said engineer at \$17,311.25
is adopted as the probable cost of said
work.

Section 2—The time within which
objections or remonstrances may be
made against said improvements shall
be on or before April 6, 1914.

Section 3—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is to be
benefitted by the proposed improve-
ment and which is to be assessed
therefor are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of
Third and Main streets in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence
in an easterly direction along the
boundary line of Main street to the
intersection of the boundary line
between lots 2 and 3, in block 18,
of the Original Town of Linkville,
now Klamath Falls, Oregon, run-
ning thence in a northerly direction
between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and
7, in said block 18, and along the
line between lots 2 and 3 and lots
6 and 7, in block 7 of the Original
Town of Linkville, now Klamath
Falls, Oregon, to the intersection
of High street; thence in an easterly
direction along the center line
of High street to the intersection of
Fifth street; thence northerly along
the center line of Fifth street to
the intersection of Mitchell street;

thence southwesterly along the center
line of Mitchell street to the inter-
section of Mt. Whitney street;
thence westerly along the center
line of Mt. Whitney street to the
center line of California avenue;
thence southwest-
erly along the center line of
California street to the intersec-
tion of Teddy street; thence along
the center line of Teddy street to
the intersection of Second street;

thence southeasterly along the center
line of Second street to the inter-
section of McKinley street;
thence south to the center line of
First street; thence southeasterly
along the center line of First street
to the intersection with High
street; thence northeasterly along
the center line of High street to a
point opposite the line between lots
6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in block
6, of the Original Town of Link-
ville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon;

thence southeasterly along the line
between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and
3, in said block 6, and continuing
on the same line to Main street,

sals to purchase will be opened and
considered), for the purchase of \$17,
327.00 City of Klamath Falls, coupon
improvement bonds, payable ten
years from date of issue, bearing a
rate of interest not to exceed six per
cent per annum, interest payable semi-
annually, principal and interest pay-
able at the office of the treasurer of
said city or at the fiscal agency of the
state of Oregon, in New York, prin-
cipal and interest payable in gold
coin of the United States of America.
Said bonds will be issued in denomina-
tions not exceeding \$500 each, and
numbered from one to in-
