OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Heart Values"

By E. C. RICHARDS, Pastor Grace Methodist Episcopal Church

"With the heart man believeth
unto righteousness."—Rom. 10:10.
Intellectual curiosity grows gray
trying to discover God, while the
heart flies straight
to his bosom, like
a bird to her nest.
"Who shall as-
cend into the hill
of the Lord, or
who shall stand
in His holy place?
He that hath
clean hands and a
pure heart; who
hath not offered
up his soul unto
vanity nor sworn
The message of
deceitfully.
verse nine, "If thou shalt confess
with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and
shalt believe in thine heart that God
hath raised him from the dead, thou
shalt be saved," is a very short and
simple creed, but the truths that it
embodies seem sufficient. And it is
a most vital creed these days. As
the days stretch on, Christmas fades
out and Easter comes in. As the
birth of Jesus loses interest, the res-
urrection calls with mightier com-
mand. Just to rise out of failure
into success. Just to rise out of
silence into eloquent speech. Just to
rise out of nothingness for good into
somethingness for righteousness.
Just to burst the bonds of death and
come into life; this truly is satisfac-
tion.
Comte was a good deal right in de-
fining the third and last stage of
human thought as that in which we
abandon metaphysics and content
ourselves with simply studying the
orders of co-existence and sequence
among things and events. Yet to do
this we must have some metaphysics.
There must be something back of
things in thought.

This backs most of our thought as
we plod on, sometimes discouraged
and disheartened, but always plod-
ding on. The heart carried Scott's
party a hundred miles after
reason would have said, "Give up."
So is it in our struggle for righteous-
ness. To reason it ought to make us
see the dollar and let everything
else go. Then the heart and conse-
quence and duty come in and have
their say, and win. To rely on reso-
lution alone is like pushing against a
mast or lifting ourselves out of the
water by the hair. To make a list of
virtues like Franklin did, and try to
go by rule of thumb is prosaic for
most of us. But to let the best in
the heart have sway seems natural.
Moreover, it has zest. Moreover, it
reaches a goal. To rely upon "a
faithful purpose, moving across the
ages and forever keeping trust with
foreseen need," and then bending our
energies to conform to the rules of
best living, this leaves few regrets
and sweetens life. And it's worth
while to have life sweet.
Huxley said: "I protest that if
some great power would agree to
make me always think what is true
and do what is right, on condition of
being turned into a sort of clock, and
wound up every morning, I should in-
stantly close with the offer." But
perhaps he did not mean it just that
way. I think he was too much of a
man to wish to be a machine. Per-
haps, in the sense of failure or for a
moment, he wished it literally. But
really, was it not the human heart
struggling for righteousness? And
can it not, in its better sense, be ap-
proached at least? If the life be
turned over to that higher power
until the soul is flooded with Him,
may we not approach true righteous-
ness without losing our individuality?
Is it not the meaning of the text?
After all, is it not true that "With
the heart man believeth righteous-
ness"?
