Uncle Sam's Jackies
Get the Best Butter

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—
The navy department has just award-
ed its contract for butter for Uncle
Sam's bluejackets. The total was
725,000 pounds—and it is interesting
to note that probably few American
families will have as good spreading
for their bread as the sailors.

Uncle Sam demands the best. Sail-
ors are cranky about their butter. In
the old days, when the bluejacket was
given anything the market afforded,
his complaints were so insistent that
a plan was adopted that gives him
about the best butter money can buy.
Although annually purchased in
lots of half a million pounds, the gov-
ernment pays from 3 to 5 cents over
the market price, in order to get ab-
solutely chemically pure butter that
will stand alike the frigid tempera-
ture of the Arctic and the blistering

heat of the tropics without spoiling.
After being packed in five pound
tins, the navy butter is put in cold
storage and held at zero temperature
until it is taken out in carload lots to
supply the ships. It is for this spe-
cial preparation and packing that the
increased price is paid.

Navy officials insist the butter is
the finest in the world. On one occa-
sion a test was made to show just
what this butter can stand. A prod-
uct which tested 95 per cent was
kept in storage eight months, and
then sent to Cuban waters, with in-
structions that it was not to be kept
on ice, but packed with the usual ship
stores. After six months in this
shape the butter, then melted to oil,
was again put in cold storage, and
then tested by the department of ag-
riculture. It tested 88 per cent—and
this after fifteen months of cold
and heat.

LITTLE GIRL HAS
A VERY BAD FALL

LOSING HER BALANCE, SHE
DROPS TWELVE FEET, ALIGHT-
ING ON PILE OF BLOCKWOOD,
CUTTING FACE AND HEAD

A most distressing accident befell

Resolution approving the plans and
Specifications prepared by the
City Engineer for the Improv-
ment of Third Street, in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon, deter-
mining the boundaries within
which the Property lies which is
to be Benefitted and to be Asses-
sed for such Improvement, and
Ordering the Publication of this
Said Resolution and the Posting
of Notices by the City Engineer.

Whereas, The common council of
the City of Klamath Falls did hereto-
fore declare its intention to improve
Third street in the said city from the
intersection of Main street to the in-
tersection of California street, and
did order the City Engineer to pre-
pare plans and specifications for such
improvement;

And, Whereas, The said City En-
gineer has filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varie-
ties of the kind of improvement pro-
posed for said street, and the same
now being found satisfactory, they
are hereby approved, and it is decid-
ed and determined, and the common
council hereby determines to improve
said street within said limits by grad-
ing to the established grade to a
width of 24 feet, from Main street to
California avenue, and hard surfacing
said roadway 24 feet wide from Main
street to Grant street with 6 inches of
crushed rock, with an asphalt binder,
and surface valley gutters and with-
out curbing, and also providing neces-
sary drainage.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the City Engineer cov-
ering such work are to be used as a
basis for such work, and any contract
for such improvement shall be based
thereon, and the estimated cost of
such work and improvement as sub-
mitted by said engineer at \$17,311.25
is adopted as the probable cost of said
work.

Section 2—The time within which
objections or remonstrances may be
heard against said improvements shall
be on or before April 6, 1914.

Section 3—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is to be
benefitted by the proposed improve-
ment and which is to be assessed
therefore are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of
Third and Main streets in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence
in an easterly direction along the
boundary line of Main street to the
intersection of the boundary line
between lots 2 and 3, in block 18,
of the Original Town of Linkville,
now Klamath Falls, Oregon, run-
ning thence in a northerly direction
between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and
7, in said block 18, and along the
line between lots 2 and 3 and lots
6 and 7, in block 7 of the Original
Town of Linkville, now Klamath
Falls, Oregon, to the intersection
of High street; thence in an easterly
direction along the center line of
High street to the intersection of
Fifth street; thence northerly along
the center line of Fifth street to the
intersection of Mitchell street;
thence southwesterly along the cen-
ter line of Mitchell street to the
intersection of Mt. Whitney street;
thence westerly along the cen-
ter line of Mt. Whitney street
to the center line of California
avenue; thence southwest-
erly along the center line of
California street to the intersec-
tion of Teddy street; thence along
the center line of Teddy street to
the intersection of Second street;
thence southeasterly along the cen-
ter line of Second street to the in-
tersection of McKinley street;

Said bonds are issued under or-
dinance No. 319 of the City of Klamath
Falls, Oregon.

Said bonds are issued for the pur-
pose of providing funds to pay a por-
tion of the cost of improving said
street from the westerly line of Kin-
lock avenue to the easterly city limits,
including intersections.
