Ulster Women Prepare for War
Nurse Corps Formed; Bandages MadeStand of the Men Against Home Rule Is Also Taken by Their
Wives and Sisters

LONDON, March 24.—"We women
are doing all we can, in every pos-
sible way, to help the 100,000 men
whom Ulster has armed and drilled in
order to remain an integral part of
the United Kingdom. Just as the
American Civil war was fought to
keep the states together, so we are
striving against separation."

In a statement made today to the
Belfast correspondent of the United
Press, the Marchioness of London-
derry, president of the Ulster
Women's Unionist Council, thus
summed up the feminine attitude in
the North of Ireland on the Home
Rule question. Her husband, who
with Sir Edward Carson was one of
the organizers of the "Ulster Pro-
visional Government," is president of
the men's Ulster Unionist Council.

"Such a change in the constitution
of these islands as is proposed in the
Home Rule Bill," said Lady London-
derry, "would not be allowed to be
passed in other civilized countries
unless by a two-thirds majority, or
some other definite and unquestioned
expression of the popular will had
been shown in support of the altera-
tion. Why, then, should this bill be
smuggled in without an appeal to the
people? It is a curious fact that the
radical party, which professes to be-
lieve in democracy, should decline to
consult the democracy."

The question of the separation of
Ireland from Great Britain is one that
concerns Great Britain as much as it
concerns Ireland. We owe allegiance
to the same king, and we fly the same
flag as Great Britain, and we will not
allow this crime to be perpetrated.

"That his majesty's army should
be sent against the most loyal of loyal
populations in Great Britain at the
bidding of the Irish nationalist party
is unthinkable."

"Ulster is more determined than
she has ever been that she will not
consent to be dominated by or even
to acknowledge in any way a parlia-
ment and an executive in Dublin. The

government seems to forget that it is
up against not merely a political or-
ganization but a whole population.

"If the radical party holds to the
belief that a country cannot be gov-
erned without the consent of the
governed, the men of Ulster and the
women backing them up will show
how steadfast is our resolve to con-
tinue to be governed as now, within
the union, and to remain under the
imperial parliament and nothing
else."

The enthusiasm of the anti-home
rule women of Ulster and the prac-
tical methods they have adopted for
backing up their men folk constitute
at present the most interesting de-
velopment in the preparations that
province is making to resist the
authority of the proposed Dublin
parliament. Of the 234,000 women
who signed the feminine edition of
the Ulster Covenant a year ago, 140-
000 have become contributing mem-
bers of the Ulster Women's Unionist
Association, and in the past few
months have raised \$20,000 for the
Ulster defense fund.

In every town and in almost ev-
ery village sewing circles have been
formed for the making of bandages,
pajamas, pillow-slips, and other ar-
ticles that would be required in war
hospitals; while members not en-
gaged in needlework are canvassing
their communities for the donation of
still other articles of hospital equip-
ment.

A large nursing and ambulance
corps has been organized along the
lines of the Red Cross under the di-
rection of the chief medical officer of
the Ulster Volunteer Force, Colonel
Davis, late of the Indian Medical Ser-
vice. In Belfast alone 700 women
have passed examinations in first aid
and nursing and 400 more are under
instruction, while still others who
have volunteered for this service have
been unable as yet, owing to lack of
teachers, to take the required lessons.

Of these a large number have en-

rolled as cooks and even laundry
women for fear they may not attain
proficiency in nursing before hostil-
ities begin.

A special detachment of nurses has
been organized by an Ulster woman
of title among the students in Belfast
University.

A hospital ship has been offered by
another Ulster woman, an English
woman sympathizer has promised to
bring over a complete field hospital in
forty-eight hours' notice, and several
wealthy women of the province have
agreed to turn their residences into
temporary hospitals or convalescent
homes.

A unique feature of the Ulster
women's activities has been the for-
mation of a corps of signallers, tel-
egraphers and postal clerks. De-
signed primarily to maintain com-
munication between various divisions
and detachments of the volunteer
force in the event of war, this corps
is now prepared to operate a complete
postal system, should the British gov-
ernment carry out its threat of cut-
ting Ulster off from the imperial
postal system and telegraph service.

In forty towns of the province
"post-houses" distinct from govern-
ment postoffices have already been
established. The head "post-house,"
at the unionist headquarters in Bel-
fast, is doing business regularly, and
so are those in some of the other
larger towns, but for the present the
smaller "post-houses" are used only
for occasional testing purposes.

The entire staff in these houses is
composed of women—twelve in the
larger towns and six in the smaller.
Boy bicycle cadets make local deliv-
eries, and country messages or letters
are delivered by motorcyclists at-
tached to the Ulster Despatch Riding
corps, who are pledged to turn out
any time of day or night when called
upon.

Resolution approving the plans and
Specifications prepared by the
City Engineer for the Improve-
ment of Third Street, in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon, de-
termining the boundaries within
which the Property lies which is
to be Benefitted and to be Asses-
sed for such Improvement, and
Ordering the Publication of this
Said Resolution and the Posting
of Notices by the City Engineer.

Whereas, The common council of
the City of Klamath Falls did hereto-
fore declare its intention to improve
Third street in the said city from the
intersection of California street, and
did order the City Engineer to pre-
pare plans and specifications for such
improvement;

And, Whereas, The said City En-
gineer has filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varie-
ties of the kind of improvement pro-
posed for said street, and the same
now being found satisfactory, they
are hereby approved, and it is decided
and determined, and the common
council hereby determines to improve
said street within said limits by grad-
ing to the established grade to a
width of 24 feet, from Main street to
California avenue, and hard surfacing
said roadway 24 feet wide from Main
street to Grant street with 6 inches of
crushed rock, with an asphalt binder,
and surface valley gutters and with-
out curbing, and also providing neces-
sary drainage.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the City Engineer cov-
ering such work are to be used as a
basis for such work, and any contract
for such improvement shall be based
thereon, and the estimated cost of
such work and improvement as sub-
mitted by said engineer at \$17,311.25
is adopted as the probable cost of said
work.

Section 2—The time within which
objections or remonstrances may be
heard against said improvements shall
be on or before April 6, 1914.

Section 3—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is to be
benefitted by the proposed improve-
ment and which is to be assessed
therefor are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of
Third and Main streets in the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence
in an easterly direction along the
boundary line of Main street to the
intersection of the boundary line
between lots 2 and 3, in block 18,
of the Original Town of Linkville,
now Klamath Falls, Oregon, run-
ning thence in a northerly direction
between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and
7, in said block 18, and along the
line between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6
and 7, in block 7 of the Original
Town of Linkville, now Klamath
Falls, Oregon, to the intersection
of High street; thence in an easterly
direction along the center line
of High street to the intersection of
Fifth street; thence northerly along
the center line of Fifth street to the
intersection of Mitchell street;
thence southwesterly along the cen-
ter line of Mitchell street to the
intersection of Mt. Whitney street;
thence westerly along the cen-
ter line of Mt. Whitney street to
the center line of California
avenue; thence southwesterly
along the center line of California
avenue to the intersection of
Teddy street; thence along the
center line of Teddy street to the
intersection of Second street;
thence southeasterly along the cen-
ter line of Second street to the in-
tersection of McKinley street;

thence south to the center line of
First street; thence southeasterly
along the center line of First street
to the intersection with High
street; thence northeasterly along
the center line of High street to a
point opposite the line between lots
6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in block
6, of the Original Town of Link-
ville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon;
thence southeasterly along the line
between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and
3, in said block 6, and continuing
on the same line to Main street,
and thence northeasterly to place
of beginning.

Section 4—The notice to property
owners shall be given as required by
chapter to those affected by the im-
provement.

Notice Inviting Proposals to Purchase
City of Klamath Falls Improve-
ment Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received
by the undersigned until Monday,
April 13, 1914, at the hour of 1
o'clock p. m. of said day, at the city
hall in the city of Klamath Falls, Ore-
gon (at which time and place pro-
posals to purchase will be opened and
considered), for the purchase of \$17,
327.70 City of Klamath Falls, com-
mon improvement bonds, payable ten
years from date of issue, bearing a
rate of interest not to exceed six per
cent per annum, interest payable semi-
annually, principal and interest pay-
able at the office of the treasurer of
said city or at the fiscal agency of the
state of Oregon, in New York, prin-
cipal and interest payable in gold
coin of the United States of America.
Said bonds will be issued in denomina-
tions not exceeding \$500 each,
and numbered from one to, in-
clusive.

Said bonds are issued under ordi-
nance No. 319 of the City of Klamath
Falls, Oregon.

Said bonds are issued for the pur-
pose of providing funds to pay a por-
tion of the cost of improving Sixth
street from the westerly line of Klamath
avenue to the easterly city limits,
including intersections.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest
bidder for cash, and for not less
than par value and accrued interest.

Each proposal to purchase said
bonds must be accompanied by a
check for five per cent of the amount
of the proposal, and certified by some
responsible bank, payable to the order
of the undersigned. Proposals
must be sealed and endorsed, "Pro-
posal to Purchase Improvement
Bonds."

The common council of said city re-
serves the right to reject and all
bids and proposals to purchase such
bonds.

Said bonds will contain a provision
to the effect that the city reserves the
right to take up and cancel such
bonds, upon payment at any time of
the face value thereof with accrued
interest to date of payment, at any
semi-annual coupon period, at or after
one year from the date of such bond
or bonds.
