Low Returns on Rented Farms
Government Gives Interesting StatisticsDepartment of Agriculture Also Proves That Most Money
Made Where There Is Livestock on Farm

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 25.—The popular belief that the farmer who lives in the city and rents his farm is in the class with predacious plutocrats was given a severe jolt in a bulletin just issued by the department of agriculture, which shows that the average return from rented farms is but 2 1/2 per cent on the investment. The size of the farm seems to have no effect on the percentage.

The bureau of farm management which developed these facts studied several hundred farms in Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. States in the corn belt were chosen because they excel almost all other regions in wealth of farm products. In this section modern machinery, with more horses and fewer men, has made the farm less than 150 acres an "efficient unit." Further readjustments are constantly taking place tending to lessen the number of persons needed and to increase the net productions of the farm.

The average labor income of the farm owners operating their own farms was \$498 for the year studied, and \$870 for the tenants. These figures are obtained by deducting 5 per cent of the capital investment from the net income. As the tenant has a smaller capital investment, this labor income is proportionately larger.

Strangely enough, the farmers making the lowest labor incomes are on big farms, but they fall through inefficient management. Poor crops, low prices for products sold, poor stock, failure to work and unused capital are given as the main causes contributing to their failure.

The income of the farmer who owns his farm is in direct proportion to his capital and the size of his farm. Men owning small farms often materially increase their incomes by renting additional land. The tenant's income is in direct proportion to the risk he assumes.

On the cash rent basis his income is greater in a good year and less in a poor year than when he rents on the share basis. Approximately one-third of the total farm expense is for labor, and for this reason the "family size" farm is the most desirable; that is, one which provides just a fair amount of work for the farmer and his sons, and permits the best use of men, horses and machinery.

Of the "crop farm," where 50 per cent or over of the total farm receipts

are derived from the sale of grain, and the livestock farm, where the farmer feeds most of his crops, the latter proved a much better investment, though the fact that they were usually larger than the "crop farm" contributed something to this result. But the average labor income of the crop farmer who owned his own farm was but \$28 per farm, whereas the average livestock farmer under similar conditions had a labor income of \$750.

"Pigs in clover" is more than a figure of speech, says the bureau of animal industry—it's a good investment, and the pig that shared red and white blossoms with the bumblebee is going to put more gasoline in the farmer's runabout than a less favored rooster that never stuck its snout outside of a pen.

Too often the hog is considered a scavenger, and his ability to use waste is regarded as his chief value. According to department of agricultural experts, however well he serves this purpose, it is pointed out that it will pay to give him good care, feed and housing. Forage crops are especially beneficial to young growing animals, though it is doubtful if it ever pays to try to keep pigs on forage crops alone. But the entire hog herd can be run on forage crops, and will profit by this method of management.

The crops best adapted to grazing with pigs are alfalfa, rape, clover, blue grass, Bermuda, rye, oats, soy beans and cow peas. The selection depends on the nature of the soil, the climate and the rain fall. Alfalfa is the greatest forage crop on soils suited to its growth. Rape and clover are also excellent feeds, both being high in protein, which is the element needed to balance ordinary grain feeds.

"Give the pig an honest chance to make you money by giving him grain feeds in their natural state," admonish experts, "and his growth, health and pork making ability will be increased."

"Egg powder" and "egg substitute" have been branded as undesirable by Dr. Carl Alsberg, chief of the bureau of chemistry, and he has refused permission for manufacturers to put such articles on the market.

Chemical analysis showed that the proposed "substitutes" were only cheap baking powder containing a

considerable excess of ground rice as a filler and colored yellow with powdered tumeric. They were shown to have no more in common with eggs or genuine powdered eggs than they had with ham sandwiches or strawberry jam.

Resolution approving the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer for the improvement of Third Street, in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, determining the boundaries within which the Property lies which is to be benefited and to be Assessed for such improvement, and Ordering the Publication of this Said Resolution and the Posting of Notices by the City Engineer.

Whereas, The common council of the City of Klamath Falls did heretofore declare its intention to improve Third street in the said city from the intersection of Main street to the intersection of California street, and did order the City Engineer to prepare plans and specifications for such improvement;

And, Whereas, The said City Engineer has filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the common council plans and specifications and estimated the cost of several varieties of the kind of improvement proposed for said street, and the same now being found satisfactory, they are hereby approved, and it is decided and determined, and the common council hereby determines to improve said street within said limits by grading to the established grade to a width of 24 feet, from Main street to California avenue, and hard surfacing said roadway 24 feet wide from Main street to Grant street with 6 inches of crushed rock, with an asphalt binder, and surface valley gutters and with curbing, and also providing necessary drainage.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering such work are to be used as a basis for such work, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon, and the estimated cost of such work and improvement as submitted by said engineer at \$17,311.25 is adopted as the probable cost of said work.

Section 2—The time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against said improvements shall be on or before April 6, 1914.

Section 3—The boundaries within which the property lies that is to be benefited by the proposed improvement and which is to be assessed therefor are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third and Main streets in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence in an easterly direction along the boundary line of Main street to the intersection of the boundary line between lots 2 and 3, in block 18, of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon, running thence in a northerly direction between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and 7, in said block 18, and along the line between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and 7, in block 7 of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon, to the intersection of High street; thence in an easterly direction along the center line of High street to the intersection of Fifth street; thence northerly along the center line of Fifth street to the intersection of Mitchell street; thence southwesterly along the center line of Mitchell street to the intersection of Mt. Whitney street; thence westerly along the center line of Mt. Whitney street to the center line of California avenue; thence southwestwardly along the center line of California street to the intersection of Teddy street; thence along the center line of Teddy street to the intersection of Second street; thence southeasterly along the center line of Second street to the intersection of McKinley street;

thence south to the center line of First street; thence southeasterly along the center line of First street to the intersection with High street; thence northeasterly along the center line of High street to a point opposite the line between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in block 6, of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southeasterly along the line between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in said block 6, and continuing on the same line to Main street, and thence northeasterly to place of beginning.

Section 4—The notice to property owners shall be given as required by chapter to those affected by the improvement.
