A Klamath School Girl's Story
of the Panama Canal's History

By Marg. Edsall, Eighth Grade, Bly School

As early as 1528 the idea of building a canal between Panama and Colon was discussed. In 1826 a line for this was traced between Panama and Portobello. Later surveys were sent from England and America to survey it.

The line measured about 193 miles. Its cost was estimated to be about \$99,000,000 and the work could be completed in about nine years. Twenty-five locks would have to be constructed.

A French engineer, M. de Lesseps, started to work early in 1880; the work continued for about six years when after a loss of life, money and engineering skill he found himself owing \$370,000,000. About twenty-two years later, in 1903, the United States purchased the rights of the French for \$40,000,000.

The work began on May 4, 1904, under the control of Colonel G. W. Goethals of the United States army and the work went on rapidly.

The next great difficulty was the unhealthy climate. To carry on the work men and supplies had to be sent 2,000 miles.

The average number of men employed was 40,000, nearly half the number of our standing army, and the total cost approximately was \$375,000,000.

The greatest enemies to overcome were malaria and yellow fever and the treacherous sliding soil. Under the directions of Colonel W. C. Gorges, also of the United States army, the canal zone, one of the world's worst plague spots, was transformed. Mosquito breeding pools were filled, paving and sewage systems were put in and screened, and eating and sleeping places provided. Today it is one of the healthiest places in America.

A trip through the canal is one you wouldn't forget, especially if you made the trip at night. The air is much pleasanter and the beautiful electric lights, which are on both sides of the canal for fifty miles, enhance its beauty.

If you made the passage from the Atlantic side, after a sail of eleven miles you enter into a series of three locks. The two leaves of the great gate which are opened to let you enter are closed and lock you in. Then you will pass through two more locks until, step by step, you are raised

to a height of eighty-five feet. Then you sail at full speed across Goethals' Lake for twenty-four miles to the entrance of Culebra Cut.

The lock gates are of steel, sixty-five feet long, seven feet thick, from forty-seven to eighty-two feet high, and weigh from 300 to 600 tons each.

The two great objects of the United States in building the canal were to place her navy in a better position to defend her coasts and to aid the world's commerce. It is estimated that by 1925 the freight passing through the canal will amount yearly to 17,000,000 tons.

It will reduce the distance between New York and Callao 8,250 miles.

The climate of Panama is tropical. The dry seasons extend from January to April, the wet seasons from May to December.

In 1915 the opening of the Panama canal will be celebrated in San Francisco, or the City of the Golden Gate, by an international exposition.

New York to Celebrate
Commercial Beginning

NEW YORK, March 27.—A series of historical, religious and educational exercises, scientific, artistic and commercial exhibits, street parades, pageants and other festivities which will continue through October 11th, began today as the opening celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the beginning of the regularly chartered commerce of what are now the city and state of New York.

The period of the celebration of the Tercentenary of Commerce from today until October 11th will be distinguished by two points of national interest, the opening of the Panama canal and the rounding out of a centennial of peace between the English speaking people.

Special exhibitions are to be held at various times during this period by New York's most famous museums and technical societies, and local and state universities will hold educational symposiums and establish exchanges in commercial education for foreign students and pupils. Each state in the Union has accepted invitations to send floats and be represented in a monster parade to be held in September, according to announcement made today at the opening exercises.

Resolution approving the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer for the improvement of Third Street, in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, determining the boundaries within which the Property lies which is to be benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and Ordering the Publication of this Said Resolution and the Posting of Notices by the City Engineer.

Whereas, The common council of the City of Klamath Falls did heretofore declare its intention to improve Third street in the said city from the intersection of Main street to the intersection of California street, and did order the City Engineer to prepare plans and specifications for such improvement;

And, Whereas, The said City Engineer has filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the common council plans and specifications and estimated the cost of several varieties of the kind of improvement proposed for said street, and the same now being found satisfactory, they are hereby approved, and it is decided and determined, and the common council hereby determines to improve said street within said limits by grading to the established grade to a width of 24 feet, from Main street to California avenue, and hard surfacing said roadway 24 feet wide from Main street to Grant street with 4 inches of crushed rock, with an asphalt binder, and surface valley gutters and without curbing, and also providing necessary drainage.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering such work are to be used as a basis for such work, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon, and the estimated cost of such work and improvement as submitted by said engineer at \$17,311.25 is adopted as the probable cost of said work.

Section 2—The time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against said improvements shall be on or before April 6, 1914.

Section 3—The boundaries within which the property lies that is to be benefited by the proposed improvement and which is to be assessed therefore are as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third and Main streets in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence in an easterly direction along the boundary line of Main street to the intersection of the boundary line between lots 2 and 3, in block 18, of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon, running thence in a northerly direction between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and 7, in said block 18, and along the line between lots 2 and 3 and lots 6 and 7, in block 7, of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon, to the intersection of High street; thence in an easterly direction along the center line of High street to the intersection of Fifth street; thence northerly along the center line of Fifth street to the intersection of Mitchell street; thence southwesterly along the center line of Mitchell street to the intersection of Mt. Whitney street; thence westerly along the center line of Mt. Whitney street to the center line of California avenue; thence southwesterly along the center line of California street to the intersection of Teddy street; thence along the center line of Second street to the intersection of Second street to the intersection of McKinley street; thence south to the center line of First street; thence southwesterly along the center line of First street to the intersection with High street; thence northerly along the center line of High street to a point opposite the line between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in block 6, of the Original Town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southeasterly along the line between lots 6 and 7 and lots 2 and 3, in said block 6, and continuing on the same line to Main street, and thence northeasterly to place of beginning.
