that come before his court are due to extravagance on the part of wives. Other causes, according to Judge Lacy are as follows:

Faults of husbands alone, 25 per cent.

Faults of both man and wife, with extravagance of the wife as the principal trouble, 49 per cent.

What could be prettier? They smack of the military, beloved of all women, yet are so thoroughly feminine, made of the soft, rich silks and satins, no wardrobe will seem complete without one.

As shown in the picture, the capes are cut along circular lines, extremely short in front, gradually lengthening until the full length of the gown is seen in back. The lining, which plays an important part in the general effect is usually a contrast in color to the cape itself. The cape here shown was made of clinging black satin, the material of the gown, the lining being an exquisite shade of rose, which made a pretty background for the gown itself and the flesh colored bodice.

The small black hat, with its band of jet and slender fancy projecting from the center of the crown, is extremely smart. Do not be surprised at the furs. They are to be worn late in the season this year, and why not? TWENTY MILLION MILES OF WIRES

IN ADDITION TO THIS, FEDERAL REPORT ON PHONES AND TELEGRAPH SAYS EIGHT MILLION PHONES ARE IN USE

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—Preliminary figures of the quinquennial report on telephones in this country have been given out by Director W. J. Harris of the bureau of the census. They show that there are in use 8,729,592 telephones.

The Bell telephone system operates 5,087,027, all other companies and systems 3,642,565.

The number of miles of wire in use in 1913 was 20,248,326, the Bell system controlling 74.7 per cent of the wire.

It is estimated that there were 13,736,658 messages or talks sent over the telephone lines of the companies, which had an income of at least \$5,000 during 1913.

In the eleven years from 1901 to 1913 inclusive there were 1319 strikes and lockouts in Canada.

Vocational guidance has been introduced into the school system of Connecticut by a recent law.

A microscope using X-rays has been perfected by a French scientist.

Germany's common schools had more than 10,000,000 students in 1911.

Sinnott Says Cuckoo Now National Bird

That the American eagle is being supplanted as the emblem of the U. S. A. in place of a cuckoo appropriating the use of its nest, through Great Britain's attitude regarding the Panama canal, was the statement made by Congressman N. J. Sinnott of this district, in his speech during the canal tolls repeal debate.

Sinnott scored the attitude of the administration and Great Britain in this matter. In part he said:

"Mr. Speaker, when I was a boy they used to tell me of a bird which had the habit of appropriating for its own selfish purposes the nests and homes constructed by the other birds. I believe they called this bird the cuckoo."

"However, I never heard it hinted or suggested by anyone that this bird,

or any bird of beast, for that matter, could successfully perpetrate this somewhat shady trick upon the habitat of the bird which in former administrations was our national emblem, the American eagle."

"Perhaps it is possible now that Secretary Bryan's 'dove of peace' has become our national symbol."

"Something akin to the possibility of this imposition must have been in the president's mind when he suggested us to let the British lion 'cuckoo' the Panama canal."

"Mr. Speaker, for my part, I am unwilling to tolerate, other than specifically provided for in the treaty, another inch of foreign encroachment on the canal, even though the cuckoo call urges it in dulcet tones or carols from the White House aviary."
