Father of Continuous
Vaudeville Is Dead

B. F. Keith, famous in vaudeville
for more than thirty years, and the
originator of continuous vaudeville,
has just died. Theatrical men say
that he did more for the entertain-
ment of the millions who could not
pay for high priced seats in theaters
than anyone else. His death was
caused by heart disease while in Flor-
ida for his health. The idea of the
"continuous performance" had been
revolving in Mr. Keith's mind for
some time, and in 1885 he decided to
try it out. This idea was suggested
by P. T. Barnum's morning, afternoon
and evening exhibitions and also from
Bunnell's Museum. At 10 o'clock on
the morning of July 5, 1885, Mr.
Keith opened a performance at the
Gaiety theater in Boston which lasted
practically until 11 p. m. The ven-
ture proved so successful that the
next year he acquired the Bijou the-
ater in Boston, and within a few years
branched out in Philadelphia, Provi-
dence, Cleveland, and other cities.

making a good demonstration of the
possibilities of agriculture on re-

From Letter Carrier
to Postmaster

William E. Kelly has stepped from
the ranks of letter carriers to be the
postmaster of one of the largest offices
in the United States. President Wil-
son nominated him for postmaster in
Brooklyn, and the senate confirmed
him on the same day. Mr. Kelly did
not work his way up. He took off his
uniform to don citizen's clothes when
he took charge of the Brooklyn post-
office. But he had advanced in another
line, which showed he had the kind
of ability the president was looking
for. For more than six years he has
been president of the National Asso-
ciation of Letter Carriers, and last
year his reelection was unanimous.
He started in the service in 1893. He
was one of the first to join the Na-
tional Association of Letter Carriers.
He was chosen president of the Brook-
lyn branch of the association and held
that place till 1907, when he was
elected national president. Each year
since he has been re-elected. The last
convention was held in San Francisco,
and then they made his reelection
unanimous. The association has 31-
400 members out of a total of 31,900
in the country. It is said to be one
of the most compact and efficient of
labor organizations.
