

Municipal Undertaker to Fight "High Dying" Cost

CLEVELAND, April 3.—The high cost of dying is threatened with extermination if Cleveland's latest municipal move becomes a reality. It is a municipal undertaker, Law Director Stockwell is advocating the project. It is not the rich he hopes to aid. He desires to protect the poor from excessive funeral charges and believes a city undertaker is the only solution to the problem.

"In many cases funeral expenses are twice the amount they should be," says Stockwell. "The persons who need the services of an undertaker, particularly the poor, are at the mercy of the undertaker. The city should furnish protection to the public by standing ready to conduct funerals at figures approximately the actual cost."

If casket makers and dealers in undertaker's supplies ally themselves with the undertakers to balk the plan, Stockwell would have the city make its own supplies at the Warrenville city farm.

BAKERS DISPUTE WEIGHT OF LOAF

SAN FRANCISCO BREAD MAKERS PROTEST AGAINST THE FIXING OF A STANDARD WEIGHT FOR BREAD IN THAT CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—What the weight of a loaf of bread should be was a question put up here today to the board of supervisors. Bakers are protesting against the fixing of any definite weight, asserting it would do away with all competition.

It was also developed that until the government fixed a standard weight for bread that it will not help the consumer much, for the reason that the amount of water that can be put into bread varies from 28 to 50 per cent.
