No Motor Service on Dorris-Chiloquin Run

The motor service between Dorris and Chiloquin, which was asked for a short time ago, has been reported upon unfavorably by the Southern Pacific. James O'Gara, district freight and passenger agent, has written the following regarding it to the Klamath Chamber of Commerce:

"I beg to advise that the matter of motor car to operate between Dorris and Chiloquin has been under consideration by our people the past two or three seasons, but owing to the fact that the passenger earnings on the trains now running are so low, we have not felt justified in putting on any additional service, the trains

now running seemingly being more than the traffic justifies.

"The schedule you have suggested to establish morning and evening service between Klamath Falls and Chiloquin would require the crews to be on duty more than sixteen hours per day, which is in conflict with the federal laws regulating the hours of labor by trainmen.

"Furthermore, there is objection to establishing a motor car service in that region for the reason that, owing to the delicate machinery, they should be frequently inspected by the shopmen, as we know by sad experience that when a motor car does not get

some attention in the shops they are not very dependable for maintaining schedule. Consequently we prefer to establish steam train service in that section if the traffic justified.

"There is another consideration, and that is, that very few of the people working at Algoma would care to pay from \$10 to \$15 per month commutation rates between Klamath and Algoma or between Klamath Falls and any other lumber plants on the branch.

"Your letter, however, will be given every consideration by us, and if we can do anything in the matter we will be pleased to advise you."

Emperor William has ordered that no official dinners shall be longer than 45 minutes, which is half the present time. He also orders that women shall no longer remain alone in the drawing room while the men savor in the dining room, in accordance with the English custom, but that all shall remain in the drawing room, where German custom allows cigarettes to accompany the coffee.

Because a comma did not appear between the words "hotel" and "restaurant" in the law prohibiting the employment of women more than 54 hours a week, Judge Wren of Houston declared the law invalid and ordered an acquittal in the case of J. A. Davis.

Supreme Court Takes up Regular Grind Anew

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Its last "stretch" of hearing arguments before final adjournment this year was entered today by the supreme court, which reconvened following a two-weeks' Easter recess. Many important decisions, including the long-awaited railway rate cases, were expected today from the court. No further recess of the court is planned until May, when it will resume hearing arguments, prepare numerous opinions, hold several wholesale "decision days," and adjourn early in June until October.

Several important "original cases" were set for argument today. Chief among them was the Louisiana sugar case. Council for Louisiana, including former Senator Bailey of Texas, appeared today to press the State's suit to enjoin administration of the new tariff act removing duty of 30 per cent from Cuban sugar.

Solicitor General Davis appeared in opposition for the government, which denies that the high court has jurisdiction.

Another "original case" ordered presented today was that of Georgia against Tennessee to enjoin harmful operation of copper smelters in Tennessee.

The "Tap line" cases were also scheduled for argument today. They involve the right of railroads to grant rate allowances, or rebates, to "tap," or branch logging, mining industrial and other subsidiary "feeder" lines. Collection of the corporation tax from companies formed to hold and vote stock of mining corporations was involved in another case set for hearing today in the government suit against the Nipissing Mining company.

Whether such companies are "doing business" and taxable under the law was the question at issue.
