Sharp-Shannon Scrap Gets Into the Courts

In Judge Gowen's court this afternoon, the case of State of Oregon versus Shannon is being tried before a jury composed of J. W. Hawxhurst, H. R. Dunlap, W. T. Smith, C. N. Meyers, J. W. Lindsay and M. O. Hering.

Shannon is alleged to have used a pick handle in a discussion with E. J. Sharp, the contractor who is building the steel bridge at Keno. The defendant was employed by the com-

plainting witness at the time of the alleged assault.

The Keno scrap returned Shannon a winner, but a return match, staged in front of the court house here, resulted in a victory for Sharp.

The trial this afternoon deals only with the trouble at Keno, as Shannon has already appeared in police court and paid his fine for the mix-up in this city. The defendant is represented by his attorney E. H. Mills.

ASQUITH HAS NO OPPONENT; NAMED

PREMIER IS AUTOMATICALLY RETURNED TO OFFICE BY THE SCOTCH DISTRICT. WILL LEAD FOR GOVERNMENT.

GOOD ROADS DAY IS APRIL 25th.

EVERY COUNTY IN STATE WILL BENEFIT BY THE VOLUNTEER WORK. TEN THOUSAND MEN EXPECTED TO PARTICIPATE.

PORTLAND, April 8.—Asking the county court of each county to assume direction and leadership in organization for All-Oregon Good Roads Day, April 25, Rufus C. Holman, president of the association of County Judges and Commissioners, has addressed to each county court the following letter:

"Saturday, April 25, is to be All-Oregon Good Roads Day, by the Governor's proclamation. All Oregon, all citizens and all organizations are requested to cooperate in this movement. If every county does its share, it will be of inestimable benefit to the roads and state, to say nothing of the excellent advertising the state will receive from the publicity that will result.

The promoters of this scheme expect that at least 10,000 men will each give a day's labor to the roads, and that in addition thereto that the day will be observed in all the public schools of the state.

I have been requested to address you in the hope that you will take the management and direction of this movement in your county, and that you will do whatever you can to get the men to cooperate and make the day a success.

In every county a banner will be given by the Portland Ad Club to the organization doing the most work. If you will call upon your road supervisors and appoint voluntary assistant supervisors for every section of road in your county and see that the

preliminary organizations are perfect, the publicity which will be given this matter throughout the press of the state, will undoubtedly do the rest.

WILL MODERNIZE THE HOLY LANDS

TROLLEY WILL BE BUILT BETWEEN BETHLEHEM AND JERUSALEM, AND MODERN LIGHTS FOR JERUSALEM.

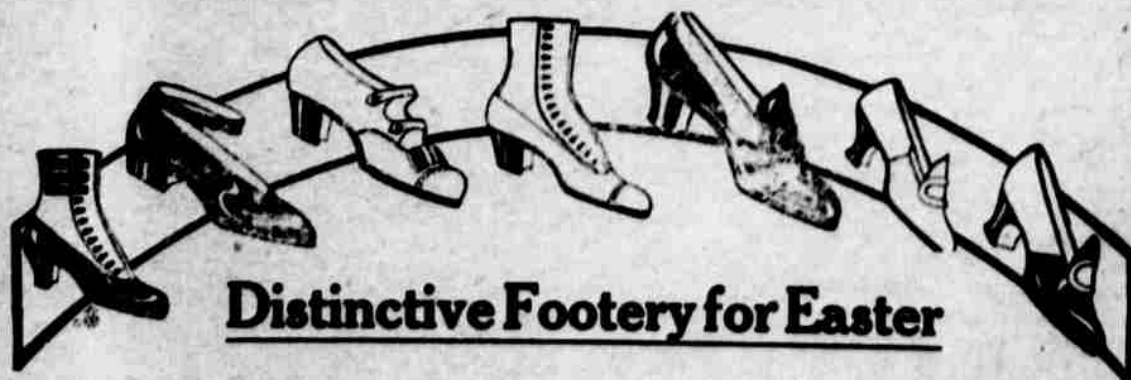
