

Duties of County Agent McCall Are Enumerated

County agricultural agents are sometimes referred to as "county advisers." This implies a misunderstanding of the real work of the agent. Advisory work is a part of Mr. McCall's duties in Klamath, but is a minor part. The county agricultural agent has about half a dozen principal functions:

- 1—He studies the agriculture of the county to learn what is being done and what is worth while agriculturally in each part of it. This study includes farm financial and organization surveys.
- 2—He gives the results of his study to farmers, not in the way of advice, but as facts observed and conclusions drawn. This is done through the local press, lectures, institutes, circulars, short courses and personal interviews.
- 3—Based on these local studies and the ascertained needs of the county, clubs, associations and the like are organized and the individuals solicited to undertake definite lines of agricultural improvements on their own farms. Organizations are also formed for co-operative buying and marketing and the standardization of farm products.
- 4—He endeavors to co-ordinate all existing agricultural agencies within the county, so that all may work unitedly and efficiently.
- 5—He develops local leadership. The task of improving the agriculture of an entire county is so stupendous that the agent must be primarily an administrator. He must inspire and accept the help of voluntary assistants in work.
- 6—He acts as the connecting link between the scientists of the research institutions of the state and nation and the farmer, presenting the results of investigations in such a way that the farmer can use them, and calling attention of scientists to the local agricultural problems of the county, and soliciting their assistance.
- 7—He gives advice. This may relate to spraying, seed treatment, mix-

ing fertilizers, combating insect pests, cultural practices, or other miscellaneous matters which are the stock in trade of every well informed agent. The giving of advice is seventh on the list, because in actually improving the agriculture of the county it is probably of least importance, though in point of time it may be the first work undertaken.

Women Are Assessors

Eight Chicago club women, politicians, were appointed and sworn in as deputy assessors by Frank W. Koraleski, secretary of the board of assessors, as a further recognition of the woman's movement. He says that the employment of women in this capacity is the first experiment of its kind in the country.

Lost River Water in an Interstate Difficulty

SALEM, April 9.—Appropriators in California claim all the waters of Pine Creek, and are depriving the incorporated town of New Pine Creek, Oregon, of a municipal water supply," says State Engineer Lewis.

"This town is located near the interstate boundary line south of Lakeview, and has a complete system of water mains installed, securing its water supply from across the state line. One-third of the water running into the stream originates in Oregon above the town's intake, and the entire stream flows into Oregon below this intake."

"I have repeatedly called attention to an unfair law adopted by California March 3, 1912, making it unlawful to conduct any water from that state into any other state for use therein."

"I have pointed out the serious situation of settlers in Langell Valley on Lost River. Their water supply is now being adjudicated by the state water board, but the waters of which stream are entirely controlled by the United States through the construc-

tion of Clear Lake reservoir, just over the line in California.

The regulating works are beyond the jurisdiction of the Oregon officials in case of shortage, and the adjudication proceedings may be of no value in case of arbitrary action of the government officials.

"To retaliate, Oregon has enacted a law authorizing the state engineer to deny applications for the diversion of water in Oregon for use in other states, if under the laws of such state water cannot lawfully be diverted for use in Oregon. The Shasta Valley project in California, which is planning to divert water from Klamath River in Oregon, may find it impossible to secure a permit until California becomes more liberal toward Oregon."

To overcome these interstate difficulties Mr. Lewis has suggested the enactment of a national water law, and was recently appointed on a committee to prepare such a law by the American Society of Civil Engineers. "Until such a law is enacted there is no remedy except through the slow, expensive and antiquated method of government by injunction," said Mr. Lewis.

To Consider Irrigation Project Management

DENVER, April 9.—The building and managing of irrigation projects in the West and the ways and means of financing such work will be considered at the irrigation conference called by Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane, which began here today.

In addition to several irrigation and reclamation experts from the department of the interior, representatives are present from Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, South and North Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Secretary Lane's original call stated that the conference would be devoted "especially to the consideration of methods of co-operation in reclamation and irrigation work between the states and the federal government."

With a view of furthering such co-operation, Governor Ammons of Colorado and Governor J. M. Carey of Wyoming called the meeting of Western governors Tuesday to agree on a program for today's meeting. As a result, it was expected that the governors would be able to stand together on a program of development.

Marcus Loew Buys Vaudeville Circuit



The announcement has just been made that the great western vaudeville circuit built up by "Big Tim" Sullivan of New York and his partner, John Considine of Seattle, has been sold to Marcus Loew, the moving picture theater man. After "Big Tim's" death many theatrical managers considered the purchase of the circuit, and several syndicates were reported to have been formed for that purpose. The rise of Loew has been one of the wonders of the theatrical business. Six or seven years ago he was not known. Now he is reputed to control millions—the price he and his friends are to give for the circuit is alone stated at \$6,000,000, which he must deliver by August 1st. He has been a newsboy, a wholesale news agent, the owner of an East Side newspaper in New York, a furrier, and one of the first to build an elaborate penny arcade. In this last he found himself. He has grown till he owns twenty-four moving picture and vaudeville houses in New York city. One of these was erected at a cost of \$700,000 on the site where he was born on the East Side of the city. Recently he has been engaged in extending his business north, west and south.
