Farmers Are Warned How to Care for Hogs

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—"Pig typhoid," "lung plague," "infective pneumonia," and other alleged swine diseases are classed as snarers and delusions in a letter just issued by the department of agriculture, which says that out of every ten sick hogs in the country at least nine have the common variety of cholera.

Farmers are urged to "forget" all high sounding diagnoses and go after the real cause of the disease, and if we can take care of the germ of hog cholera the pig will usually overcome the other infections himself.

"From a practical standpoint the important thing is to recognize hog cholera as soon as possible after its appearance in a herd in order that anti-hog cholera serum may be applied before the disease progresses too far. Good serum may be depended upon to protect well hogs, and even to cure a large percentage of those in the earliest stages of the disease, but it will not be of much avail when used upon hogs that are already visibly sick. Remember, the hog cholera kills millions of hogs where other diseases kill thousands.

Russia Threatens the Liberty of Finland

HELSINGFORS, Finland, April 10.

The Finnish people are facing their darkest hour in their long and heroic struggle to maintain their ancient liberties, if a report reaching here from St. Petersburg is to be believed.

It is said that the czar has decided in the event that the Finnish diet per-

sists in refusing to pass the new laws suggested by the Russian government and which would have the effect practically of destroying what is left of the Finnish constitution, to proclaim a "state of war," permanently garrison the capital with two infantry and two Cossack regiments, and replace the Finnish police by Russian gendarmes.

Would Make Over the State Tax Law by 1920

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, April 10.—"Oregon 1920!" will be the slogan of the commonwealth conference, which will be held May 27, 28 and 29, under the auspices of the University of Oregon, declared Professor F. G. Young recently.

"Just as Boston has its 1915 movement, just as Reed College has started a 1915 movement for the city of Portland, so the University will inaugurate a 1920 movement for the State of Oregon," he said.

Professor Young, in explanation of the meaning of the slogan, said that the end in view is to discover the defects in the state and to find a way to remedy them. It is proposed to accomplish this task by 1920. The program at the commonwealth conference will be made up of discussions that have in view the different interests; to bring out clearly what should be done; and thus hasten the slowness of development.

"The University for some time has been considering the adoption of this motto for the commonwealth conference. My senior thesis class has for the past year been working on subjects that center around an 'Oregon 1920' movement. The general suggestion has been made that the University in all of its activities marshal its forces into a well concerted effort to promote an 'Oregon 1920' movement."

Norway's Socialist Party Has Big Growth

CHRISTIANA, April 10.—Notable progress was made by the Norwegian labor socialist party in the past twelve months, according to its annual report, issued today.

The active contributing membership increased from 43,550 to 50,000, while, in spite of the poor means of international communication, branches have now been established in every part of the country.

There are now in all thirty-two la-

bor socialist papers, of which twenty-four are owned by the party. Of the twenty-four, nine appear daily, nine three times a week, five twice a week and one weekly.

As a result of the various municipal elections the number of labor socialist members of local councils increased from 1,209 to 1,803, among whom are forty-five women. In three towns and in twenty-one county districts the party now holds an absolute majority in the councils.
