Says Look to Fitness
of the Office Seeker

Klamath Falls, Ore., Apr. 10, '14.
Dear Editor:—With the approach
of the primaries and the selection of
suitable candidates for the various
election, it should be of interest to
every voter in the county as to the
candidate's fitness for the office he
seeks. Simply because a man seeks
a certain office under a party name
is no reason that he should be sup-
ported. The days of blindly follow-
ing parties and party leaders are
past. Twenty-five or thirty years
ago, or even later, this method was
all but universally followed. Be-
cause a candidate was listed under
the democratic or republican banner
was sufficient reason, or prima facie
evidence, of a man's fitness for the
office he sought.

The days of blindly following party
or party leaders are gone, never to
return. The cry of the "party loyalty
howler" has ceased. Some still howl;
they hear but the empty echo of their
own voice. Oratory has its place. The
orator will always move the hearts of
men and women. But future or-
atory will move the people, not by
partyism nor by befogging the ques-
tions at issue, but by strict adherence
to true patriotism; an altruistic spir-
it burdened with peace, justice, the
rights of all the people.

The rank and file of all the people
are thinking. They are reading, criti-
cizing, forming opinions, judging.
Every issue is scrutinized; every
candidate sized up. This is right. No
man by party name should ride into
office. The history of officehood in
the United States is replete with in-
stances of unworthy candidates riding
to office on the crest of purely party-
ism. This has been our great sin of
the past. The whole body of people
are suffering from the folly of our
erring fathers. The tragedy of the
century just closed will be revealed
when some heart burdened with the
truth shall reveal the inside work-
ings of congress, state legislatures,
county officials and city councils.

Truths have been revealed at inter-
vals sufficient to create suspicion. Sus-
picion brought investigation; investi-
gation revealed past party spirit un-
der the name of graft. Graft has
been, and is yet, the curse of our
fair land. Our daily papers are her-
alds of anti-graft. True reformers
are denouncing the grafters. Laws
are being enacted to punish the graft-
er. The whole body of wronged
people have said grafting shall cease.

The wrong doer has been so closely
associated and identified with party
patriotism, and the party patriot,
that the potent power and fascinating
effect of party cry has lost its savor.
"If salt hath lost its savor, where-
with shall it be salted," is a scriptu-
ral injunction axiomatically true.
Party spirit, party name, party life,
are alike dead, unless they pulsate
with truth and justice. A most
striking example of the writer's con-
tention was exhibited less than two
years ago, when the Chicago Repub-
lican National Convention was split
in twain, leaving two cripples, neither
able to stand alone—unwilling to
stand together. The tragedy was
overwhelmingly shocking. The party
of power for almost all the time since
the Civil War hath fallen to pieces,
because of strife and contention. But
strife and contention hath marked
the path of advancement. If the re-
publican party ever stands again, it
will rehabilitate on the principles of
truth and justice unadulterated. Half
truth no longer sufficeth. We want
the whole truth; nothing but the
truth. Justice for all is the slogan.
Special privileges died when the
people awoke to the malpractice of
party leaders, never to live again.
We have entered upon a new era.
This era is known by the altruistic
spirit. Personal freedom, linked to
truth and justice, constitute the tri-
nity that shall rule the age we are now
entering upon.

We shall always have parties.
Bodies of men and women are es-
sential to conduct the nation's busi-
ness; but let them be known as
truth lovers and justice seekers. This
spirit of Americanism shall yet rule
the nation. This spirit is not dead.
True, it has slumbered. The night
has passed; the light is upon us; we
breathe the air of a new freedom.
No, not a new freedom, but the free-
dom that animated Washington, Jef-
ferson and Lincoln. "Truth crushed
to the earth shall rise again" was not
an idle saying. Time has revealed it.
Patriotism hath proclaimed it. It
lives in the hearts of Americans.
Henceforth the candidate for office
must have something more than party
to offer the people. Party privi-
leges and name have been abused in
the past; may be in the future. We

have discovered the man behind the
gun as the real factor. So the man
behind the candidate, or, rather, in
the candidate, shall most concern us
when we mark our ballot. We will
ask, "Is he true?" "Is he honest?"
"Is he capable?" "Will he conduct
our business efficiently and economi-
cally?"

Waste, so far as the taxpayers are
concerned, is as great a sin as graft,
though known by a different name.
The spirit of extravagance is yet in
our national blood. That it shall be
drawn is not prophetic; it is a fact.
The people have spoken. It must
cease to flow on and on. Efficiency
and economy, we demand. This is
right; it is just. Some officials are
efficient, but not economical; some
economical, but not efficient. There
are men both efficient and economical.
These are the men we desire to fill
our offices, national, state, county
and municipal. The last two are
vitally interesting to us at present.
Scrutinize the candidates; know
them, if possible; know where they
stand, and what they stand for. Ev-
ery candidate should stand for some-
thing. He should so state. Let the
people, whom he expects to support
him, know where to find him. This
is just to all concerned. Don't try to
fool the people. Don't think their
honesty and goodness can be trifled
with. Honesty pays big dividends.
The people are not slow to reward.

Thus far the race between candi-
dates is being made with dignity.
Let dignity and honor prevail. Mud-
slinging, I sincerely hope, is dead in
Klamath county. "Let the dead past
bury its dead," the fiat of the Prince
of Peace, should rule the candidate
for office. The citizens of Klamath
Falls and Klamath county should
stand for dignity, both in and out of
office. Politics should be clean, cam-
paigns should be clean, and above all,
office holding should be clean. The
only sorry feature of our great coun-
try has been our political feature. The
balance is grand; sublime. Why not
clean politics? That's up to the vot-
ers; with clean politicians we shall
have clean politics. If this spirit pre-
vails, the business of the county and
city shall be conducted decently and
orderly. Don't vote, then howl. If
you must howl, howl first, then vote.
But be sure that you vote for the
right man. Fraternally yours,
