How Storms Are Forecasted
Nothing Occult in Sending Out WarningGovernment Weather Bureau Follows Up Storm's Progress
and Tells About When It Will Hit
Certain Place

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 16.—
Just because accidents will happen
like that "fareback" which on March
4, 1909, isolated Washington, the
weather bureau wants it distinctly
understood that its predictions aren't
guesswork. They haven't any goose-
bone prophets up at the observatory;
they don't believe in Brother Ground-
hog, nor the tree frog, nor the moss
on the trees; nor any of those other
old fashioned weather guides. The
process of figuring out the kind of
weather that is coming is a highly
scientific work.

Some folks have an idea there is
something occult about the forecast-
ing of storms, frosts and floods. Not
a few think the observers must neces-
sarily get their data by reading the
planets, the stars and the moon. But
they don't.

"Suppose a business man had or-
dered a carload of pineapples from
Hawaii," says a statement just issued

from the bureau in explanation of its
work. "He would know the average
time it would take the steamer to
make the trip to the Pacific port, the
average time for unloading and load-
ing into refrigerator cars, and the
average number of days to be allowed
for the trip across the continent to
New York. His estimate, however,
would be subject to error, because
the steamship might be delayed by
fog or the railroad cars by accident."

"Storms, like pineapples, as a rule
do not originate in the United States.
They come to us from the Philippines,
Japan, Siberia, Alaska, Canada or the
Gulf of Mexico. The weather bureau
gets cable, telegraphic or wireless no-
tice of a foreign storm."

"Station after station and vessel
after vessel, reports the storm's ar-
rival in its neighborhood, so that the
general direction and rate of progress
can be determined very early. In
fact, the arrival of some storms can
be determined ten days in advance.
"The forecasters watch for the re-

gion of low barometer, which is the
storm center around which the winds
blow. The whirl of eddy moves bod-
ily forward with the general eastward
drift of about 650 miles a day in our
latitudes. The forecaster determines
the direction of movement of the
storm and its velocity.

"When weather disturbances are
reported, the forecasters know from
long experience about how long it
takes them to reach our Pacific coast,
and then know how long after they
will reach the Atlantic coast."

"To keep tab on cold waves that
come into the United States from
Canada and Alaska, the weather bu-
reau studies the Canadian weather re-
ports. England sends reports from
Iceland, the British Islands and Con-
tinental Europe and daily reports
come from St. Petersburg. A storm
sometimes encircles the world in its
course."

"The same business like system of
tracing the track of a storm is used
in determining the arrival of frosts."

Six Million Bees Are
Sent Via Parcel Post

PARKERTOWN, Ohio, April 16.—
Uncle Sam's parcel post will carry
about 6,000,000 queen bees from this
place during the coming summer in
small packages destined to all parts
of the civilized world. H. G. Quirin,
who operates perhaps the largest bee
farm in the United States, estimates
his orders will call for that number
of queens.

Last year Quirin shipped queen

bees with their "escort" of working
bees, in little parcel post packages to
all parts of America, Europe, Japan,
Cuba, China and the West Indies.

Quirin has raised queens he valued
at \$300. These, however, were ex-
traordinary stock. The regular stock
are worth from \$1 to \$3. In addi-
tion to his queens, the bee magnate
expects to have employed about 10,
000,000 workers the coming season,
making many tons of honey.

England Using Movies
to Strengthen Army

LONDON, April 16.—The secret of
the British war office's strenuous and
spectacular campaign for recruits is
out. It had been suspected that the
army was hard up for men when the
authorities a couple of months ago
began inserting full page advertise-
ments in newspapers throughout the
country pointing out the delights of
army life, and supplemented this ap-
peal with a flood of posters and pam-
phlets and finally a moving picture
film which it now develops is being
shown in almost every town in the
United Kingdom.

The reason, it now develops, is that
the military establishment, including
regulars, special reserves and terri-
torial (militia) is short nearly 100,-
000 men.

The regular army enlistments alone
fell 2,225 in the past year, according
to the annual report of the war office.
