WILL USE MOVIES IN MISSION WORK

PROTESTANT DENOMINATIONS
SEND CAMERA MEN TO THE FAR EAST TO GATHER SCENES TO AID IN MISSION WORK

NEW YORK, April 16.—With elaborate motion picture equipment, three operators in the employ of foreign missions, left here today for the Far East, where they will take motion pictures of missions scenes, and use the movies at various missions in teaching the gospel of Christ.

Ten years ago motion pictures of mission scenes in the Far East were taken, but they were not done by an expert, and the motion picture at that time had not reached its present near perfect state.

The attempt, therefore, was a failure. The man behind the plan is Charles A. Rowland, chairman of the

Laymen's Movement of the Southern Presbyterian church, and a member of the executive committee of foreign missions of that denomination.

Dr. J. P. McCallie and Louis A. Holman, an art editor and photographic expert, with Rowland, are the three men who will superintend the work of taking the motion pictures.

Another Hamersley Heiress to Wed



Miss Catherine Livingston Hamersley, whose ancestors have been in New York society since it was founded, and who, besides being a near relative of the Duke of Marlborough, divides something like \$40,000,000 or \$50,000,000 with her brother, is about to wed. But many heiresses as well connected as this young woman have married before.

A peculiar and interesting fact about Miss Hamersley is that she was brought up in ignorance of the fact that she was worth some \$20,000,000. She was the daughter of J. Hooker street.

Hamersley, who built a Fifth avenue mansion. He left instructions in his will, as did his wife on her death, that the young woman and her brother were to be brought up in a wholesome manner. He was very definite on the direction that neither was to know of the inheritance of millions till of age.

The history of this fortune goes back more than a century. Andrew Hamersley was a drygoods merchant and iron monger in Hanover Square, in 1784, and lived at 97 Greenwich street.

He has directed the city engineer to survey the said streets and prepare plans and specifications and estimates of cost of various kinds of improvements of the said streets; and the said city engineer having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of members of the Common Council Plans and specifications and estimates of cost of the several varieties of improvement;

And, Whereas, The said plans and specifications and estimates are found satisfactory after examination by the council;

Be it Resolved, That the said plans and specifications are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby expresses its determination to improve the said streets within the limits defined by grading the same and improving with oil macadam pavement with a 4-inch Water Macadam base and a 2-inch Asphalt Macadam top, with a concrete curb and gutter as per plans and specifications on file, together with the necessary drainage. The width of roadway to be 24 feet.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer covering the proposed work are to be used as a basis for the said work, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such work and improvement as submitted by said engineer at \$15,779.75, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of the said work.

And it is further resolved, That the time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against the proposed improvement shall be on or before the 11th day of May, 1914.

And it is further resolved, That the boundaries within which the property lies that is to be benefited by said improvement is all that property lying adjacent to the said streets, from Main to Upham within a line on each side of said streets so improved, distant 130 feet from the side lines of said streets, from Upham to Donald streets 110 feet on each side, and from Worden avenue to Sargent avenue 150 feet on each side, along the line of the streets improved;

And it is further resolved, That the notice required by charter to be given to the property owners affected by the proposed improvement shall be duly given as by the said charter provided.
