CHILDREN'S PART IN CIVIC
AFFAIRS

THERE may be those who will
scout or ridicule the idea that
the children should have a part in
civic affairs. But if we ever reach the
time when the whole people will com-
prehend the value and benefits of civic
improvement; when civic righteousness
shall be the rule, and not the excep-
tion, and when the spirit of civic
pride has been fully aroused and de-
veloped—in short, when we have at-
tained to the ideal civic conditions,
we must begin with the education
and training of the children along
lines that will tend to the making of
such conditions.

Realizing that right citizenship and
city planning and upbuilding are the
greatest problems confronting the
American people today, Chicago has
recently adopted for use in the pub-
lic schools a text book on city plan-
ning. The idea of instituting a course
in the public schools in municipal
patriotism and civic betterment may
seem novel at first, but once the ben-
efits are seen it will be taken up by
other cities. Give the children a
course in city planning and city build-
ing, and with this course some practical
work, and in a few years many
of our vexed municipal problems will
be solved.

To properly estimate the value of
certain things, special training is
necessary, and unless one has had
that training a full appreciation of
their worth will be lost. Civic bet-
terment cannot be fully realized until
we begin to educate the children in
civic affairs—in civic duty, civic re-
sponsibility and civic pride.

There are some examples where
this truth has been recognized in
plans for civic betterment, and the
results show marked and permanent
benefits. Though children naturally
love beauty and wholesome surround-
ings, they need to be educated and
trained along right lines to bring
out their natural tendencies. The
Chicago idea of a course of study in
the schools coupled with some practical
work in civics, will cultivate
patriotism and fit the coming genera-
tion to grapple with the problems of
city planning and city building.

In the growth of the clean-up move-
ment the greatest success has been at-
tained in those cities where the children
are a factor in the work. In many of
the leading cities organizations and
leagues of boys and school children
are taking the lead in all work for
the beautifying and sanitation of their
cities.

In New York city the juvenile
leagues—children's clubs—have great-
ly helped betterment work. Started
first as an experiment to work out, by
actual test, a practical scheme for
civic education, to train boys toward
good citizenship by getting them to
DO things, they have grown until they
have proved that it is possible to in-
terest the boys, even in congested
districts, in civic affairs and inspire
young Americans with civic pride,
love of home and patriotism.

Practical education in civics will
give the young people a broader view
of life, and teach them that which
helps the community as a
whole is good for every individual

thereof. The boys and girls of Klamath
Falls should be organized into a
junior municipal league and educated
along these lines, and ere many years
ideal civic conditions will obtain here.
In our city planning and city building
let us not forget that the building of
the future citizen is of paramount im-
portance.

How Life Insurance
Risks Are Figured

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—Ac-
cording to the records of the big life
insurance companies of the country,
slender women are better risks than
stout women, and single women live
longer than their married sisters. "A
woman who is thirty pounds under
weight," said George H. Beaudry of
a coast life insurance company, "is 18
per cent better risk than a woman
who is thirty pounds over weight.
Mortality among women who are thirty
pounds under weight is only 94 per
cent, whereas among women over-
weight the mortality is 112 per cent."
"The spinster's chances for long
life are 50 per cent better than those
of her married sisters. Out of 149,
000 single women insuring the mor-
tality rate was only 81 per cent, while
among the women insuring with their
husbands as beneficiaries the percent-
age was 126 per cent. The married
woman has not an even chance with
the married man, at least in the first
few years of married life. The per-
centages among the men increase
with age. For the first two years of
insurance women have a high mor-
tality rate, whether they be married
or single, and this fact the companies
attribute to a premonition which women
are declared to possess. The in-
surance people call this instinct, and
they say women feel possibilities of
death so keenly that often the com-
panies lose during the first two years
of policy holding.

"Two per cent of all the policies
the companies grant to suicide, and
the figures relating to women's sui-
cide throws an interesting light on
the facts. Death from self-inflicted
causes among spinsters total only six-
tenths of 1 per cent, while among
married women the percentage is less
than one-tenth higher. The companies
make a distinction, however, among
the married women. Between the
"happily married" class, or women
whose insurance is drawn in favor of
their husbands, and the single women
there is almost no difference.

Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received
by the Police Judge of the city of
Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday,
May 11th, 1914, at 8 o'clock p. m.,
for the purchase of \$7,291.43 city of
Klamath Falls, Oregon, improvement
bonds. These bonds are authorized
by Ordinance No. 323 of said city, and
will mature in ten years from date of
issue; said bonds being optional after
one year, and may be redeemed in
numerical order at the option of the
city at any semi-annual coupon period
at or after one year from date of
issue.

These bonds are issued to provide
funds for part payment of the cost of
constructing a sewer in that part of
the city known as the Fourth Sewer
Unit.

These bonds will be sold to the
highest and best bidder for cash, for
not less than par value and accrued
interest; and will bear interest not
exceeding 6 per cent.

Each proposal to purchase must be

Resolution

Declaring the Intention of the City of
Klamath Falls to Improve Elev-
enth Street in Said City From
Main Street to Upham Street;
Worden Avenue From Upham to
Donald, and Donald Street From
Worden Avenue to Sargent Street

Whereas, A petition signed by more
than ten freeholders of the city of
Klamath Falls, Oregon, and filed with
the Police Judge thereof, and present-
ed to the Common Council, having for
its object the improvement of Elev-
enth street in said city from Main
street to Upham street; Worden ave-
nue from Upham street to Donald
street; Donald street from Worden
avenue to Sargent street, including all
the intersections of said streets;

And, Whereas, The Common coun-
cil has directed the city engineer to
survey the said streets and prepare
plans and specifications and estimates
of cost of various kinds of improve-
ments of the said streets; and the said
city engineer having filed with the Pol-
ice Judge for the consideration of
members of the Common Council
plans and specifications and estimates
of cost of the several varieties of im-
provement;

And, Whereas, The said plans and
specifications and estimates are found
satisfactory after examination by the
council;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans
and specifications are hereby approved
and the Common Council hereby ex-
presses its determination to improve
the said streets within the limits de-
fined by grading the same and improv-
ing with oil macadam pavement with
a 4-inch Water Macadam base and a
2-inch Asphalt Macadam top, with a
concrete curb and gutter as per plans
and specifications on file, together
with the necessary drainage. The
width of roadway to be 24 feet.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the city engineer cov-
ering the proposed work are to be used
as a basis for the said work, and any
contract for such improvement shall
be based thereon and the estimated
cost of such work and improvement as
submitted by said engineer at \$18,-
779.75, is hereby adopted as the prob-
able cost of the said work.

And it is further resolved, That
the time within which objections or
remonstrances may be heard against
the proposed improvement shall be
on or before the 11th day of May,
1914.

And it is further resolved, That

the boundaries within which the prop-
erty lies that is to be benefited by
said improvement is all that property
lying adjacent to the said streets,
from Main to Upham within a line on
each side of said streets so improved,
distant 130 feet from the side lines of
said streets, from Upham to Donald
streets 110 feet on each side, and
from Worden avenue to Sargent ave-
nue 150 feet on each side, along the
line of the streets improved.

And it is further resolved, That
the notice required by charter to be
given to the property owners affected
by the proposed improvement shall
be duly given as by the said charter
provided.
